Newspaper Laws.

We would call the special attention of Post Masters and subscribers to the FOREST REPUBLICAN to the following synopsis of the Newspaper laws:

1. A Postmasters is required to give notice by letter, (returning a paper does not answer the law), when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reason for its not being taken.-Neglecting to do so makes the Postmaster responsible to the publisher for the payment.

2. Any person who takes a paper from the Post office, whether directed has subscribed or not, is responsible for

3. If a person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all acrearages, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect
