

MINUTES

Of the 5th Annual Meeting of the Forest County Teachers' Institute, held at Tionesta, Jan. 23, 24, 25, and 26.

Institute called to order at 10 o'clock, A. M., by County Superintendent, S. F. Rohrer, who occupied the chair. Prayer by Rev. S. S. Burton, of Tionesta. Address by Supt. Rohrer, to the teachers; Reply by Rev. Burton, followed by A. C. Porter and Supt. C. H. Dale. The president then made the following appointments:

Secretaries, P. M. Clark, Miss Emma E. Arner. Executive Committee, A. C. Porter, Miss Sadie N. Arner, Miss Mary Harrington. The chairman announced the hours of meeting at 9 o'clock A. M., 1:30 and 7 P. M. Class drill on Decimal Fractions by Supt. C. H. Dale. Adjourned to meet at 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Roll called. Drill on Decimal Fractions continued by Supt. Dale. Class drill on Grammar by Rev. Burton. Adjourned until 7 P. M.

EVENING SESSION. Institute met at 7 P. M. Roll called, response by sentiment. Essay by Miss Lizzie M. Kerr, subject, "Despise not small beginnings." Discussion, question, "Resolved that corporal punishment be abolished in our schools;" opened by Rev. Burton, followed by A. C. Porter, E. L. Davis, Miss Clara Hunter, Miss Mary McCurdy, J. N. Tietzworth, S. D. Irwin, W. G. Ladds, Supt. Dale and Mrs. E. L. Davis; Discussion closed in favor of the negative. Rehearsal, "The Old Arm Chair," by A. C. Porter. Motion by S. S. Burton that the Secretary in calling the roll, call five names, those whose names are called to proposed a question to be answered at next meeting. Adjourned.

Calisthenic Singing introduced by Supt. Dale. Analysis of English Grammar, by W. G. Ladds. President announced the following committee on Resolutions: George Luper, Miss Clara E. Hunter, Miss Mary H. McCurdy. Adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Questions answered. Class drill on Education, conducted by Rev. S. S. Burton. Calisthenic Singing resumed by Supt. Dale. Recess.

Drill on Primary reading by Supt. Dale. Motion by M. M. H. McCurdy, that a committee be appointed to prepare a Memoir of L. M. Stewart, on motion of S. S. Burton. A. C. Porter, Miss M. H. McCurdy, and P. M. Clark, were appointed the committee. Adjourned to meet at the Presbyterian Church at 7 P. M.

EVENING SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Music by Prof. Weber. Roll called, response by sentiment. Essay by D. Harrington, subject, "Self-Government." Song by Misses Florence and Eva Knox. Select reading by P. M. Clark, subject "Birth-day Recollections." Recitation by Sadie N. Arner, subject "Don Leon's Bride." Music by Misses Minnie and Nettie Hunter. Lecture by Rev. Burton, subject "The Model Teacher." Music by Mrs. Agnew and Prof. Weber. Essay by Mary H. McCurdy, subject "Failures in the School Room." Motion by Rev. J. A. Hume, that a copy of Miss McCurdy's essay be solicited for publication in the FOREST REPUBLICAN and Press, adopted. Song by Miss Alice Wolcott. Essay by A. C. Porter, subject "The Last Decade." Song by Mrs. Agnew, Prof. Weber and W. R. Dunn. On motion Adjourned.

THURSDAY, JAN. 25. MORNING SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Roll called, questions answered and asked. Class drill on Geography, by Rev. Hume. Calisthenic Singing conducted by Supt. Dale. Recess. Class drill on Reading, by Supt. Dale. Adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Questions asked and answered. Discussion, what is the best method of preventing whispering in school? Opened by Supt. Dale, followed by Rev. Hume, Rev. Burton, W. G. Ladds, and S. D. Irwin. Second question, should one scholar assist another out side of recitation hours? Opened by W. G. Ladds, followed by Rev. Hume, Rev. Burton, S. D. Irwin, and Mrs. S. M. F. Jones. Motion by S. D. Irwin that a vote be taken on the question whether one scholar should assist another, decided in the negative unanimously. Class drill on Reading continued by Supt. Dale. Recess.

Penmanship by S. D. Irwin. Class drill on Notation and Numeration by Rev. Burton. Adjourned to meet in Presbyterian Church.

EVENING SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Music by Prof. Weber, assisted by Miss Alice Wolcott. Roll called, response by sentiment. Essay by Mrs. E. L. Davis, subject "The Teacher." Song by Mrs. Agnew. Recital by Mary H. McCurdy, subject, "We sow what we reap." Music by Prof. Weber assisted by Mrs. Agnew. Select Readings by Rev. J. A. Hume, subjects "Wounded," "The smacker in school," and "On the shores of Tennessee." Recitation by the same, subject "The Frog." Song by Misses Florence and Eva Knox. Essay by Miss Clara Hunter, subject, "Tyranny of Custom." Song by Misses Alice and Nannie Wolcott. Prize Essays were read by the following: S. D. Irwin, A. C. Porter, P. M. Clark, and Miss Blanche Burton. Duet by Mrs. S. M. F. Jones and W. R. Dunn. Rehearsal by E. B. Freeman, subject "Shamus O'Brien." Essay by Mrs. S. M. F. Jones, "The Influence of Surroundings in the Education of the Young." Motion by Rev. Hume that Mrs. Jones' essay be published in the county papers, with the endorsement of the Institute, adopted. Adjourned.

FRIDAY, JAN. 26. MORNING SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Roll called. Questions answered. Class drill on Reading by Supt. Dale. Recess.

Allegation, Alternate and Medial, by W. G. Ladds. Adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION. Institute met pursuant to adjournment. Roll called. Spelling contest for prize offered by Prof. A. C. Porter, won by P. M. Clark. Class drill on History by Supt. Dale. Recess.

Calisthenic Singing, conducted by Supt. Dale. Committee on Resolutions reported as follows: WHEREAS, Pursuant to notice, the teachers of Forest having again met in convention,

Resolved, 1st. That we hail this fifth annual meeting with pleasure. 2d. That we are thankful to God for a season of prosperity, as respects the world, and also increased prosperity in educational matters. 3d. That we recommend a development of the moral, as well as the intellectual faculties in our school. 4th. That the dignity of our calling is not surpassed by any other profession, and that we, therefore glory in our work, and will strive to render ourselves worthy of it. 5th. That we fully recognize the necessity of professional reading and study by the teachers. 6th. That we recommend a greater degree of attention to rhetoric, by incorporating the same into their teachings, and encouraging efforts in Declaration and Recitation. 7th. That education is the only safeguard of free institutions, and under the present circumstances, our schools should be sustained at all hazards. 8th. That the Directors of the county should establish a uniformity of text-books throughout the entire county.

9th. That the thanks of the Institute are cordially extended to Prof. Weber, Mr. Dunn, the Misses Knox, Miss Hunters, Mrs. Jones, Mrs. Agnew, and all who have so kindly furnished us with music during our sessions. 10th. That the thanks of the Institute are cordially extended to Prof. C. H. Dale, Supt. Rohrer, Revs. S. S. Burton and J. A. Hume, Messrs. E. B. Freeman, Ladds and Irwin, and our worthy Secretaries, Miss Arner and P. M. Clark. Also the School Directors in attendance, and the citizens of Tionesta for their kindness and hospitality.
