A combination called the South Improvement Company have formed a coalition with several railroads, the result of which is that the freights on oil have been advanced so much as to threaten the oil business. The producers are protesting loudly against it, and are determined not to be swindled. A new railroad is talked of, to be controlled by the producers, to transport their own oil.

When struck, one day last week, it commenced producing at the rate of seven barrels per day, but came up to twenty-five, at which rate it was producing yesterday. We heartily congratulate our friends on their success in this instance, and hope they may find many more good wells on their lease, and find enough oil to satisfy them for all their previous disappointments.

"Producer," in the Titusville Herald, complains of the excessive royalty charged by owners of producing territory, and says that the same men who bitterly denounce the Southern Improvement Company monopoly, are to-day exacting a royalty of three-eighths to one half on wells that produce less than five barrels. Let every producer that is paying too much royalty and can get no reduction, submit his views with facts and figures to paper, and thence to the public. Perhaps a graded royalty may be the result.
