

History of the Original Co. G. 5th REGIMENT, PENNA VOLUNTEERS.

BY A MEMBER OF THE COMPANY.

In the summer of 1861 Tionesta, not to be behind her neighboring towns, raised a company of men for the war. Early in the spring a company had been formed and had met several times to drill. Once they went to Newtown and partook of a dinner furnished by the citizens of that place. At another time we met at Jas. Gordon's and had a dinner. At last under the call of 300,000, it was decided that we go, and the company met and elected D. S. Knox, Captain; George Stowe, 1st Lieut.; D. W. Clark, 2d Lieut.; with the full compliment of Sergeants and Corporals. At once recruiting commenced in earnest. Hearing that Col. McLane was raising a Regiment at Erie, Capt. Knox went there and secured a situation for his company. On Monday, Aug. 19, 1861 the company met at Tionesta and had a drill, speeches, dinner &c., and the ladies presented it with a flag. On calling the roll we found there were 60 ready and willing, and I might say anxious for duty. The next morning early we embarked on the Allegheny, on board of a Flat Boat, commanded by Capt. Wm. White, and propelled by two horses. Reaching Conroe's Tavern, late at night, those of us that could staid in the house and the rest in the barn. Bright and early next morning we were afloat, and reached Irvineton about 9 o'clock, expecting to connect with the 9:30 train on the P. & E. R. R. for Erie, but we were happily disappointed, for on landing we were met by a committee of the Irvineton people who invited us, and insisted on our staying to dinner, which at that early hour was nearly ready. We could not refuse; and such a dinner! where the edibles come from I never could conjecture. But where a good many went to, I know. After eating all we could there was taken up—not of fragments—but of No. 1 provisions, three large boxes full, and shipped with us to Erie and very fortunate for us as it was some three days before we could get our rations regular. And had it not been for the boxes from Irvineton, some of us would have went hungry. On reporting to Col. McLane we found that we could not be mustered without having 81 men. Capt. Knox, leaving the company in command of Lieut. Stowe immediately returned to Tionesta for more recruits. Before Captain returned to Erie, Lieut. Stowe with the 66 men were regularly mustered into the U. S. Volunteer service. On Sept. 5th, Captain returned with 23 more men, which made our number 80. On Sept. 6, Capt. Knox and Lieut. Clark were mustered into the Service. A few days after a company from Youngsville was broken up and we received 12 men from that which made us full 101 men. These 101 men are the ones of whom I wish to speak of at present. The following are their names and what has become of them. We left Erie on the 16th of Sept., and the Tionesta Rangers were represented as follows:

D. S. Knox, Capt., resigned Dec. 30, 1862. George Stowe, 1st Lieut., promoted to Capt., Dec. 31, 1862. Killed at Laurel Hill, Va., May 8, 1864. D. W. Clark, 2d Lieut., promoted to Quartermaster of the Reg't, July 16, 1862. Alexander Holeman, 1st Serg't., was made Serg't after we were in camp at Hall's Hill, and John Herrington was made 1st Serg't.

Samuel D. Girt, Serg't, was made a Corporal after we were in camp at Hall's Hill. Served his full time. Levi Burford, Serg't, wounded at Malvern Hill, Va., July 1st 1862. Wounded and taken prisoner at Laurel Hill, May 8, 1864. Discharged Feb. 23, 1865. W. W. Diamond, Serg't, wounded at Malvern Hill, July 1st, 1862, and discharged by reason of wounds, March, 25, 1863. John H. Van Gieson, Serg't, wounded at Gain's Mill, June 27, 1862. Wounded in the Wilderness and taken prisoner while on his way to Bell Plain. Died in Florenceville Prison. As this has already taken more time than I anticipated, I shall be obliged to close and write you again at an early day.

SENATOR DELAMATER.

We copy the following in regard to the remarks recently passed upon Senator Delamater's alleged violation of his pair with Senator Knight:

We have already stated editorially that the pair of Senator Delamater and Senator Knight was fairly and honorably terminated by notice of the former to the latter, and that Mr. Delamater was perfectly right in the course he pursued when the McClure-Gray committee was about to be drawn. But as some of the newspapers in his district and in other parts of the State, still continue to censure him, we republish from the Beaver Radical the following paragraph, which fully vindicates the Senator's course:

Senator Delamater, of Crawford, is abused by certain editors because it is alleged he violated his pair with Senator Knight when the committee was drawn to try the contested election of McClure vs. Gray. There was no violation of the pair, and consequently there is no occasion for abuse. The pair was made before the election in Philadelphia, and had no reference to and did not extend to the drawing of a committee. It is always in the power of a Senator to terminate a pair by notice, and this notice was given several days before the time referred to; but if that had not been the case, as Senator Billingsfelt well said, his pair only extended to questions of voting and not to involuntary acts, such as allowing his name to go into the box, which he could only prevent by leaving Senate.

Terrible and Fatal Accident.

On Saturday, February 24th, Mr. Mahlen M. Mulford, one of the employees in Messrs. Bryan & Co's steam mill at this place, met with a terrible accident, from the effects of which he died in about two hours. It appears that after dinner, as they were about to start the mill, Mr. Mulford took a short ladder and got up to shift the belts on the sliding saw pulleys; after he had shifted the belts he went over to the engineer to start up, and in moving his ladder to the other side of the large iron shaft he commenced taking apart the shifter. The mill had hardly got under full motion when the skirt of Mulford's coat was caught on the coupling on the iron shaft, which was running at 240 revolutions a minute; and he was immediately drawn to and wound around the shaft, at every revolution his legs and feet striking the ceiling above. The alarm was at once given and the steam shut off, but before the mill could be stopped his body dropped to the floor, stripped of every particle of clothing except his shirt collar—his boots, coat, pants and under clothing having been literally torn in shreds. When picked up he was insensible, but soon recovered consciousness, told how the accident happened, said that he was fatally injured and was dying. He was placed upon a stretcher and carried to his home on Fifth street, where he died at half past two o'clock p. m., nearly two hours after the accident occurred. Upon examining the body it was found to be bruised all over, while his right side from the arm to the hip was smashed in—the bones and ribs being broken in small pieces, and his right leg and left foot broken.—Emporium Herald.

STABBING AFFRAY.—Two young bloods named respectively Gibson and Staver, who were attending common school at Rynd farm, had a dispute about some ink. When they got out of the house Gibson made for Stave, who drew a knife and cut him on the arm. Gibson then threw Staver and was using the good arm quite lively, when Staver inflicted two severe wounds in his thigh. Gibson was taken off, when Staver lit out lively, but Gibson pursued him for several rods, when he fell, exhausted from loss of blood. He was taken in a John Wallace's, and Dr. Westlake called. It was feared his wounds would prove fatal, but at last accounts was considered out of danger. They are both about 20 years of age. The teacher resigned next morning. We understand he was a lad about 17 yrs old, and for some time has been left to have charge of the school, as he was afraid to chastise any of the small ones for fear the larger ones would thrash him. We think the directors are not without cause in regard to this, as they should have known better than to keep such a teacher.—Pet. Cen. Record.
