Hiram L. Green, discharged on Surgeon's certificate, Nov. 26, '63. Died a short time after his return home.

Samuel C. Hunter, wounded at Laurel Hill, May 8, '64, absent in hospital at expiration of term.

Moses B. Hunter, wounded and prisoner at Gettysburg, discharged Sept. 20, '64, expiration of term. The men of the company would probably know him as well by the name of Bluffer, a name he got by his ready tact in getting himself out of scrapes.

William Hogan, wounded at Malvern Hill, discharged May 27, '63. James Hunter, wounded at second Bull Run. Transferred to veteran reserve corps.

George Huddleson, transferred to veteran reserve corps. For nearly two years George lost his voice, and for a long time was not able to speak above a whisper.

Samuel Henderson, died of wounds received at Malvern Hill.

John N. Heath, died at Point Lookout, Va.

Augustus L. Hook, killed at Malvern Hill.

Jacob Host, killed at Laurel Hill. He was but a boy when he was killed, but a braver one never was. He was inside of the enemy's breast-works using his bayonet, when killed.

John Hulley, wounded at Malvern Hill, Fredericksburg, Laurel Hill and Peables Farm. Discharged, June 1, '65. Veteran.

George C. Johnson, died at Harrison's Landing.

James D. Kerr, discharged, Sept. 20, '64. Expiration of term.

Charles Keizer, wounded and prisoner at Wilderness, discharged, June 28, '65. Veteran.

John H. Kerr, died at Hall's Hill, Va. The first death in our company.

John F. Kinsler, killed at Malvern Hill.

Jacob B. Leedom, discharged, Sept. 20, '64. Expiration of term.

Hiram K. Lyons, discharged, Sept. 20, '64. Expiration of term.

William Lyon, wounded at second Bull Run. Discharged by reason of wounds, Nov. 19, '62.

William H. Lowrie, killed at Laurel Hill.

George S. Mason, wounded at Gaines' Mill, discharged at expiration of term, Sept. 20, '64.

John Myers, wounded at Gettysburg, discharged at expiration of term, Sept. 20, '64.

Otis C. Monroe, died May 13, of wounds received at Laurel Hill, May 8, '64.

John D. McClatchie, wounded at Laurel Hill, absent in hospital at expiration of term.

A. T. McCalmont, wounded at Hancock Court House, May 27, '62, and at Laurel Hill, May 8, '64, absent in hospital at expiration of term.

Chauncey McCray, discharged on Surgeon's certificate, in '62.

G. W. McCalmont, wounded at Malvern Hill, and discharged by reason of wounds Nov. 11, '62.

Silas McCalmont, wounded and prisoner at Gaines' Mill. Transferred to veteran reserve corps.

H. W. McCalmont, wounded at Gaines' Mill, and killed at Wilderness, May 5, '64. Veteran. When we were mustered in at Erie, the mustering officer wanted to know if there were any more McCalmonts left. There were four, over six feet each.

Wm. W. McDonald, discharged on Surgeon's certificate, Jan. 16, '63.

Robert W. McLane, died at Point Lookout.

Joseph Nellis, wounded at Gettysburg, discharged at expiration of term.

Robert Osgood, discharged on Surgeon's certificate.

E. T. Purdy, wounded at Fredericksburg, discharged at expiration of term, Sept. 20, '64.

Joseph C. Pettigrew, wounded at Peables Farm, discharged July 25, '65. Veteran.

The following items are from the Brookville Republican:

On Monday evening last, fire was discovered in the stable of A. Snyder, on Main street, and the alarm immediately given. By well directed efforts the flames were confined to the building, and our town spared the infliction of another calamity similar to that of last November, which at one time was very imminent.
