The Y. M. C. A. of Tionesta will hold a meeting in the M. E. Church, on Friday evening next, which will be addressed by delegates of the Y. M. C. A. of Tidioute. The public generally are invited to attend.

A son of C. F. Gillespie of Whig Hill has been lying very ill with brain fever, at the Holmes House for a week or more. He was moved to Mrs. Riddle's house on Sunday, and we believe his condition is improving.

The mumps have made their appearance in our midst, much to the disgust of those who have accumulated them. Swelled chops are not a very beautifying acquisition, but add very much to the territory of the cheek.

I. G. Butterfield departed yesterday morning to take a passenger train on the Pittsboro Valley R. R. in the capacity of conductor. "I. G." has been in the business a number of years, and knows how it is done. He will make a popular officer.

Grove & Wolcott's well at White Oak was down 275 feet on Saturday and the work going on as rapidly as possible. They are confident of success, and have our best wishes for that "consummation devoutly to be wished."

A meeting of the school directors of this borough was had on Saturday evening last, to select teachers for the ensuing term, but owing to the unsettled state of the exchequer no action was taken, and it is doubtful if we have any school before July.

A cellar has been dug under Mr. McKay's part of the unfinished building adjoining this office, with a stream from the spring above flowing through it. Mr. McKay wants to finish his part as soon as possible, in order to have a conveniently arranged post-office.

While in Meadville last week we had the pleasure of hearing the Philharmonic Society rehearse a Cantata which is to be given in the Opera House some time in May. The Society is under the leadership of Prof. Boynt, the teacher of our Brass Band, and is one of the best we ever heard.

The rafting season is about over, and times are easing up. About one-half of the lumber in the creek was run out, and our lumbermen rejoice. For the last three days very little lumber has been run past here, but some timber rafts are still going. There is danger of sticking on Pithole Riffle now.

Now is the season the bold fisherman is wont to meander forth with rod in hand to "tackle" the trout which inhabit our turbulent streams. As the spring has thus far been very backward, we have not heard of any catches yet, but expect soon to know the state of the streams about here, when we will let our friends know how it is themselves.

We have been sorry to notice a great deal of drunkenness in town recently, notwithstanding our "local option" ordinance forbids such doings. Several times during the last week we have heard volumes of obscenity and profanity issuing from drunken lips on our streets. Our ordinance is a good one, but if it is not enforced, it had better never be enacted.

The bridge is going to be built if there is anything in contracts, bonds, greenbacks and energy. On Saturday last a contract was entered into between William Bell, W. W. Breckenridge and James Breckenridge, partners, bridge builders, of Mercer county, and Gen. S. Hunter of this place, which stipulates that the party of the first part shall build the bridge across the river near where the ferry posts are now standing; the exact location not yet being decided upon, before the 1st of November next. The first installment has been paid the contractors and each party has given bonds for the performance of its part of the contract. Consequently we must believe that the bridge will be built during the coming summer. We did not learn what the price to be paid to the contractors was, but we suppose the figures are at least as reasonable as could have been obtained of other parties. The bridge prophets of this place and generation are doomed to see their profound deductions scattered to the four winds of heaven, and their prophecies crumble to dust. How many have we heard remark that the present generation would never see a bridge built over the river at this point, and if all who now live were to survive to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the day they first saw light no bridge would then connect us with the outer world, and Geo. Hunter would still be running the ferry! We don't remember having heard any one save Geo. Hunter himself within the last eighteen months express the opinion that the bridge was forthcoming. But now we are as certain that the bridge will be built as we used to be that we would get a whipping if we went to school, which was not exactly the "substance of things hoped for" but was certainly "the evidence of things not seen."

That this will be the means of building up our town is not to be doubted. New families will move in, and manufacturing will be started, and Tionesta will take a stride that will astonish rival towns, and make them look to their laurels and trade. A healthier tone prevades community, and cheerfulness and good nature abound. Let the good work go on.
