THE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENCY.

The following remarks pertaining to the electing of School Superintendents of this State is from the pen of Hon. J. P. Wickersham, in the last number of the School Journal. We publish it at this time because ere our next paper is generally circulated, the convention will be over.

Intellectual Qualifications.—As a test of intellectual qualifications, the law renders any one ineligible to the office of superintendent who does not possess one of the following documents: A diploma from a college legally empowered to grant literary degrees; a diploma or State certificate issued by the authorities of a State Normal School; a professional or permanent certificate, issued at least one year prior to the election; a certificate of competency from the State Superintendent, or a commission as a county, city or borough superintendent.

Moral Qualifications.—The law says no person shall be eligible to the office "unless he has a sound, moral character." The very letter of the law should be adhered to, and will be, so far as the Department is concerned.

Professional Qualifications.—It is provided in the law, that a person cannot hold the office of Superintendent of schools unless "he has had successful experience in teaching within three years of the time of his election."
