NATIONAL REPUBLICAN NOMINATIONS.

The National Republican Convention held at Philadelphia last week, nominated U. S. Grant by acclamation for President, and Henry Wilson, of Massachusetts for Vice President, on first ballot. No nominations are necessary. Both these men are known to every intelligent voter in the Union. A more harmonious and enthusiastic convention was never held in the United States. We append the platform adopted by the Convention:

THE PLATFORM.

The Republican party of the United States, assembled in National Convention in the city of Philadelphia, on the 5th and 6th days of June, 1872, again declares its faith, appeals to its history, and announces its position upon the questions before the country:

1. During its eleven years' supremacy it has accepted, with grand courage, the solemn duties of the time. It suppressed a gigantic rebellion, emancipated four millions of slaves, decreed equal citizenship of all, and established

ed universal suffrage, an exhibition of unparalleled magnanimity; it criminally punished no man for political offenses, and warmly welcomed all who proved their loyalty by obeying the laws and dealing justly with their neighbor; it has steadily decreased, with a firm hand, the sentiment and discords of the great war and initiated a wise policy towards the Indians. The Pacific Railroad and similar vast enterprises have been generally and successfully conducted, the public lands freely given to actual settlers; immigration protected and encouraged and a full acknowledgement of naturalized citizens rights secured from European powers; a uniform national currency has been provided, repudiation frowned down, the national credit sustained under most extraordinary burdens, and new bonds negotiated at lower rates; the revenues have been carefully collected and honestly applied, and despite the annual large reductions in rates of taxation the public debt has been reduced during General Grant's presidency at the rate of one hundred million dollars a year; a great financial crisis has been avoided and peace and plenty prevail throughout the land; menacing foreign difficulties have been peacefully and honorably compromised, and the honor and power of the nation kept in high respect throughout the world. This glorious record of the past is the party's best pledge for the future, and we believe the people will not entrust the government to any party or combination of men who have resisted every step in this beneficial progress.

2. Complete liberty and equal equality and the enjoyment of all civil, political and public rights should be established and effectually maintained throughout the Union by efficient and appropriate State and federal legislation; neither the law or its administration should admit of any discrimination in respect to citizens by reason of race, creed, color, or previous condition of servitude.

3. The recent amendments to the national constitution should be cordially sustained, because they are right—not merely tolerated because they are a law—and should be carried out according to their spirit by appropriate legislation, the enforcement of which can be safely entrusted only to the party that secured these amendments.

4. The National Government should seek to maintain an honorable peace with all nations, protecting its citizens everywhere, and sympathizing with all who strive for greater liberty.

5. Any system of civil service under which subordinate positions of the Government are considered rewards for mere party zeal, is fatally demoralizing, and we therefore favor a reform in the system of laws which shall abolish the evils of patronage and make honesty, efficiency and fidelity essential qualifications for public position, without practically creating a life tenure of office.

6. We are opposed to further grants of public lands to corporations and monopolies, and demand that the national domain be set apart for free homes for the people.

7. The annual revenues, after paying current debts, should furnish a moderate balance for the reduction of the principal, and that revenue, except as much as may be derived from a tax on tobacco and liquors, be raised by duties on importations, the duties on which should be so adjusted as to aid in securing remunerative wages to labor, and promote the industries, growth and prosperity of the country.

8. We hold that in the undying honor of the soldiers and sailors, whose valor saved the Union, that their pensions are a sacred debt of the nation, and the widows and orphans of those who died for their country are entitled to the care of a generous and grateful people; we favor such additional legislation as will extend the bounty of the Government to all our soldiers and sailors who were honorably discharged, and who in line of duty became disabled, without regard to length of service or cause of such discharges.

9. The doctrine of Great Britain and other European powers concerning allegiance, "Once a subject, always a subject," having at last through the efforts of the Republican party been abandoned, and the American idea of individual right to transfer his allegiance having been accepted by the European nations, it is the duty of our Government to guard with jealous care the rights of adopted citizens against assumption and unauthorized claims by their former governments, and we urge continual and careful encouragement and protection of voluntary immigration.

10. The franking privilege ought to be abolished and the way prepared for a speedy reduction in the rates of postage.

11. Among questions which press our attention is that which concerns the relations of capital and labor, and the Republican Party recognize the duty of so changing legislation as to afford full protection and the amplest field for capital, and for labor, the creation of capital, the largest opportunity and a just show of the mutual profits of these two great servants of civilization.

12. We hold that Congress and the President have only fulfilled an imperative duty in their measures for the suppression of violent and treasonable organizations in certain late rebellions and for the protection of the ballot box, and therefore they are entitled to the thanks of the nation.

13. We denounce the repudiation of the public debts in any form or disguise, as a national crime; and we witness with pride the reduction of the principal of the debt and of the rates of interest upon the balance, and confidently expect that our excellent national cur-

rency will be perfected by a speedy resumption of specie payment.

14. The Republican party is mindful of obligations to the loyal women of America for their noble devotion to the cause of freedom, and their admission to wider fields of usefulness is received with satisfaction, and the honest demand of any class of citizens for additional rights should be treated with respectful consideration.

15. We heartily approve the action of Congress in extending amnesty to those lately in rebellion, and rejoice in the growth of peace and national feeling throughout the land.

16. The Republican party profess to respect the rights reserved by the people to themselves as carefully as the powers delegated by them to State and to Federal government; it disapproves of a resort to unconstitutional laws for the purpose of removing evils by interference with rights not surrendered by the people to either State or National government.

17. It is the duty of General Grant to adopt such measures as will tend to encourage American commerce and ship building.

18. We believe that the modest and patriotic, the earnest purpose, sound judgment, practical wisdom, incorrupt integrity and illustrious services of U. S. Grant have commended him to the hearts of the American people, and with him at our head we start to-day on a march to victory.

From the Butler County Soap Mines.

SOAP MINES, May 31, 1872.

ED. FOREST REPUBLICAN:—Accepting your courteous request extended so long ago to "dish up" something for your paper, we proceed to comply. The Soap Mines are a myth; this we have ascertained to our financial injury. We came here to engage in operations connected with the mines, having previously provided myself with elaborate and expensive machinery, manufactured on scientific principles. We sold a vast quantity of soap in the same forms as the oil is marketed, "Call," "B. O.," "S. O. A. P." "Spot" &c. All this, bear in mind, before we had visited the mines. Accordingly, with soap on the brain, but 'nary' any on our visage for the previous six months, we took our departure from your sweetly slumbering village (we mean no offense) and wended our way hither in quest of Soapperado. Upon arriving in the vicinity where, according to the eminent soapologists with whom we had consulted, the mines were said to be located, we put up for the night at a farm house. The inmates being very communicative and kind we embraced the first favorable opportunity to introduce our darling project, the soap question. Upon inquiring the distance to the mines all looked at us in perfect amazement; "Stranger," said the honest farmer, "you are sold, there are no soap mines here." He had rightly judged by our serious manner that we were in earnest, and proceeded at some length to dispel our soapy visions. We witted, slumber was not given to our eyelids that night. As soon as we could hear any of the family stir in the early morning, we arose and making a hasty toilet—soap minus—stepped down stairs where we were kindly saluted by the farmer. We could observe a broad grin prevailing his countenance, but our feelings were such that we could not reciprocate the expression, for very good reasons. Were not our anticipations for the speedy accumulation of wealth suddenly dispelled? and had we not been egregiously sold? Rallying our shattered spirits as well as we could we entered into a lively discussion as H. Gree Lee would say, on "what I know about farming." In answer to our inquiry in reference to the average yield of crops just harvested, he said, "Taters, corn and sich didn't do very well, but buckwheat and pumpkins, (whistling) 'whe'!"

After partaking of a hearty repast, and giving the farmer a "stand-off" in compensation for hospitality, we came to Parker to meet the parties with whom we had made contracts for future delivery of soap. The time having elapsed they "called" their soap, of course we could not "ante." We had contracted to furnish several thousand tons at a small margin, and the price of soap suddenly advancing when it became known at the "boards" (we mean the wash-boards) that our bubble had busted, we had to furnish the article or settle the difference; we were compelled to the latter course, and in consequence we are "rubbed out."

We have returned to the scene of our departed greatness, and have commenced to bore for oil, and judging by the amount of hard rock we encounter, the farmer was about right, as soap would suggest the idea to us of something soft, but the internal regions of this country do not verify that theory—but we have already inserted more "lye" than we had intended.

We observe by your paper that there are quite a number of aspirants for official honors in your country.

New boys we have this to say, kindly by way of advice. Fight it out "on the square," and don't enter into personalities—consider it beneath your honor and dignity; also do not allow your tonsorial adornments to become erected, thereby causing you to assume pugilistic attitudes towards each other.
