THE FOURTH OF JULY.

The Fourth of July was celebrated in Tionesta in a manner very becoming to the descendants of the authors of American Independence. The old cannon was uncarthd, and Thos. Van Gieson's anvils brought into requisition and such a noise kept up during intervals of the day and evening as must have made John Hancock's bones rattle with satisfaction. The programme was carried out with the exception of the wheelbarrow race, which was undoubtedly overlooked owing to the enthusiasm superinduced by the reverberations of the aforesaid cannon and anvils. The orations were pronounced able efforts by those who heard them. The "fantastics," although few in numbers were powerful in actions. A more laughable display has not taken place in Tionesta since the Cornplanter tribe held high carnival here. The rain interfered somewhat with the programme, but dampened not the order of the celebrators, nor wet the powder of the cannoners. All went home at the close of the exercises fully convinced that the Fourth of July was a good institution, perfectly satisfied that they lived in "the land of the free and home of the brave."

Tionesta has been having a gay season ever since the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. Parties have been given by many of citizens, and all, we believe were enjoyed immensely. On Friday evening, 6th inst., a tea party was given at Judge Dale's. On Monday evening following a party gathered at M. W. Tate's. On Tuesday evening they congregated at the residence of S. J. Wolcott; Wednesday evening a cotillion party was contemplated at the Dowers, but on account of the rain and absence of sufficient shelter at the said Dowers, the party was given up. On Thursday evening a large party gathered at Sheriff Davis' mansion, and the hall over the battle was converted into a ball-room and the festivities continued until a late hour. And now this evening, if the weather permits, is to be put in trying to wear out the platform at the Bowers. We would that Tionesta could have these seasons spread out over more time, and so give the gay revellers more time to recuperate; but so it has been ever since we have been acquainted with the place; nearly all decide on about the same time for festivities, and then for an indefinite season young society lies dormant waiting for some one else to start the ball. When we get at it, however, there ain't a place this side of Paris where people enjoy themselves more.

On one or two occasions recently, we have spoken of developments in oil going on up Hunter's Run about three miles, on land adjoining that of Azro Copeland. Well, the developments have reached a culmination in the shape of a 20-barrel well. It is said that it will be torpedooed, when it is expected that a large well will be the result. Parties owning land in that vicinity are looking tickled and we have now a prospect of a large oil excitement in the immediate vicinity of Tionesta. More wells will at once be put down. Leases are being let rapidly. We have long predicted that some lucky party would eventually make his everlasting fortune in oil about Tionesta, and here we see the first fruits of that prediction. We hope, from the bottom lifts on the heels of our boots that this may be the very best district that has ever been discovered in America. We will keep our readers carefully posted in the developments of this region. Mr. Kepler, who is building in town is the principal owner of the new well.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF PENNSYLVANIA.

Joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment of the Constitution of this Commonwealth be proposed to the people for their adoption or rejection, pursuant to the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to-wit:

AMENDMENT. Strike out the sixth section of the sixth article of the Constitution, and insert in thereof the following: "A State Treasurer shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the State, at such times and for such term of service as shall be prescribed by law."
