As soon as this revision is completed he shall visit every dwelling house in his district and make careful inquiry if any per-son whose name is on his list has died or removed from the district, and if so, to take the same therefrom, or whether any qualified voter resides therein whose name is not on the list, and if so, to add the same thereto, and in all cases where a name is added to the list a tax shall forthwith be added to the list a tax shall forthwith be assessed against the person, and the asses-sor shall in all cases ascertain by inquiry upon what ground the person so assessed claims to be a voter. Upon the completion of this work it shall be the duty of each as-sessor as aforesaid to proceed to make out a list in alphabetical order of the freemen above twenty-one years of age claiming to be qualified voters in the ward, borough, township or district of which he is assessor, and opposite to each of said names state whether said freeman is or is not a house-keeper, and if he is, the number of his res-idence, in towns where the same are numbered, with the street, alley or court in which situate, and if in a town where there are no numbers, the name of the street, alley or court on which said house fronts: also the occupation of the person, and where he is not a housekeeper, the occupa-tion, place of boarding and with whom, and if working for another, the name of em-ployer, and write opposite each of said names the word "voter," and where any person claims to vote by reason of natur-alization he shall exhibit his certificate thereof to the assessor, unless he has been for five consecutive years next preceding a voter in said district; and in all cases where the person has been naturalized, the name shall be marked with the letter "N." Where the person has merely declared his ntention to become a citizen and designs to be naturalized before the next election, the name shall be marked "D. I." Where the claim to vote is by reason of being between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-two, as provided by law, the word "age" shall be entered, and if the person has moved into the election district to reside since the last general election the letter "B." shall be placed opposite the name.— It shall be the further duty of each assessor as aforesaid, upon the completion of the duties herein imposed, to make a separate list of all new assessments made by him and the amounts assessed upon each, and

It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Commonwealth to prepare forms for all the blanks made necessary by this act, and furnish copies of the same to all the county commissioners of the several counties of the Commonwealth; and the county commissioners of each county shall, as soon as necessary after the receipt of the same, at the proper expense of the county, procure and furnish to all the election officers of the election districts of their respective counties, copies of such blanks, in such quantitles as may be rendered necessary for the discharge of their duties under this act.

SEC. 17. That elizens of this State temporarily in the service of the State or the United States Government, on electical or other duty, and who do not vote where

other duty, and who do not vote where thus employed, shall not be deprived thereby of the right to vote in their several election districts if otherwise duly quali-Pursuant to the provisions contained in

the 76th section of the act first aforesaid, the judges of the aforesaid districts shall rep-resentatively take charge of the certificates of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one indue from each district, at the borough of Tionosta, on the third day after the election, being FRIDAY, THE STA DAY of NOVEMBER, 1872, then and there to perform the duties required by law of said judges.

Also, that where a judge, by sickness or unavoidable accident, is unable to attend such meeting of judges, then the certificate of return shall be taken charge of by one of the inspectors or clerks of election of the district, who shall do and perform the duties of said judge unable to attend.
