Election Proclamation.

Whereas in and by the lst Section of the Act of General Assembly of Pennsylva-nia, passed the 17th day of March, 1862, entitled, "An Act to permit the voters of this Commonwealth to vote every three years upon the question of granting ils-censes to sell intoxicating liquors," it is enjoined upon the Sheriff of every county to give notice of such election to be held, and in pursuance thereof, I. T. J. VAN GIESEN, High Sheriff of the county of GIESES, High Sherill of the county of Forest, do therefore make known and give this public notice to the electors of the said-county of Karest, that a special elec-tion will be held in the said county on

Manday, Pebruary, 3d. 1873.

at which time the qualified electors of said county will vote "for heave," or "against heenso" in the marmer provided by the lat section of the aforesaid Act, hereingt-

SECTION 1. Be it cnacked, &c., That on the third Friday in March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, in every city and county in this Commonwealth, and at the annual municipal elections every third year thereafter, in every such city and county, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors and Judges of elections in the cities and counties, to receive tickets, either written or printed, from the legal voters of said cities and counties, labelied on the outside "lieense," and on the inside, "for lieense," or "against lieense," and to deposit said tickets in a box provided for that purpose by said inspectors and judges, as is required by law in the case of other tickets received at said election; and the tickets seceived shall be counted, and a return made to the clerk of the and the tickets so received shall be count-ed, and a return made to the clerk of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the peace of the proper county, duly certified as is re-quired by law, which certificate shall be laid before the judges of the said court after said election shall be held, and shall be filled with the circumstance. filed with the other records of the court; and it shall be the duty of the mayors of cities and sheriffs of counties, or any other officer whose duty it may be to perform such and also three weeks before such election every third year thereafter; Provided, That this get shall not be construed to repeal or affect any special law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors, or prohib-iting the grantic of flectness: Provided, That when the municipal and township

iting the grantice of licenses: Provided, That when the municipal and township obetions in any country or city do not occur on the third Friday in March, the election provided for this section shall be held on the day fixed for the municipal elections in said county. And provided further, That all licenses granted after the first day of Janhary, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, shall cease, determine and become void on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, if the district for which they shall be granted determines against the granting of license; and the treasurer of the proper county shall then refund to the holder of such license the moneys so paid therefor, for which the said treasurer shall be entitled to credit in his accounts with the continuous of the votes cast, the inspectors and judges, and clerks of said election shall be governed by the laws of this commonwealth regulating general elections; and all the pandites of said election have are hereby extended to, and shall apply to the voters, impectors, judges and clerks, voting at and in attendance upon the elections held under the provisions of this net.
