CAUCUS--NOMINATIONS FOR BOROUGH OFFICERS

We are under obligations to S. D. Irwin, Esq., for the following report of the Caucus held at the Court House, on Monday evening last, to nominate candidates for the several offices of the Borough.

JAN. 27, 1873.

At a meeting of the citizens, Dr. Winans acted as Chairman, and S. D. Irwin, Esq., as Secretary. Mr. Irwin stated the object of the meeting, viz: to put in nomination candidates for the several Borough Offices, to be voted for at the Spring Election, to be held, on Monday, Feb. 2d. Moved by W. P. Mercillott, Esq., that the voting be done by ballot. Carried. Moved by E. L. Davis, that where there was only one candidate, that the nomination be made unanimous. Carried.

J. G. Dale was nominated for Burgess. Being the only candidate, nomination was made unanimous. The following gentlemen were nominated for Town Council: W. P. Mercillott, Geo. Bovard, S. J. Wolcott, T. B. Cobb, P. D. Thomas, A. B. Kelly.

For Overseers of the Poor, Geo. Robinson, and D. S. Knox were nominated. S. Clark, Jas. Cole, Geo. Haslet, F. Kopman, and J. N. Teitworth, were candidates for nomination for the office of Constable. S. Clark was nominated.

S. Clark was also unanimously nominated for High Constable. The following gentlemen were candidates for nomination for the office of School Directors: J. B. Agnew, S. J. Wolcott, W. P. Mercillott, W. W. Mason, and Jas. Woodington. S. J. Wolcott and Jas. Woodington were nominated.

S. Clark, Geo. Haslet, W. B. Harlan, and D. S. Knox, candidates for Assessor. S. Clark, receiving a majority of the votes was declared nominated.

S. D. Irwin, C. A. Randall, E. L. Davis and H. O. Davis, were candidates for Assistant Assessors. C. A. Randall and S. D. Irwin nominated.

For Judge of Election, Jno. D. Hulings and Jos. Grove were candidates. Jno. D. Hulings nominated.

W. B. Harlan and Wm. Lawrence were unanimously nominated for Inspectors of Election. J. T. Dale and S. D. Irwin were unanimously nominated for Borough Auditors.

FILE YOUR CLAIMS.—If there are soldiers in this county entitled to additional bounty under the act of July 28, 1866, they should file their claims at once, as it will be remembered this act, giving \$100 to every soldier who enlisted in the army of the United States after the 18th day of April, 1861 for a period of not less than three years and received his honorable discharge of \$50 for two years enlistment after April 14th 1861, expires on the 31st of the present month, Congress having on the 22nd of April last, passed an act prolonging the time for filing such claims until January 31st, 1873.

On Monday of this week Stokes' counsel presented a bill of exceptions to Judge Davis. Among other exceptions the bill averred that three of the jurors in the case were personally hostile to Stokes. After a short argument Judge Davis granted the order to show cause why the verdict should not be set aside, and made it returnable before Justice Boardman on Friday morning. Now they will have another time getting a jury, and if there is any chance of Stokes getting justice, a new trial can be had for the asking. In the meantime Stokes is living like a fighting-cock, and his cell is better furnished than three-fourths of the parlors in the country.

Senator Cutler, of the Erie District, has introduced a bill to establish an additional insane asylum for the counties of Erie, Crawford, Mercer, Venango, Warren, McKean, Elk, Forest, Cameron and Clarion. The Governor is to appoint Commissioners to select as a site a farm of not less than 250 acres. Several papers are just now saying that their particular territory is the place. Our idea is that it makes no difference about the spot selected by the newspapers, because the Commissioners will undoubtedly perform their duty without having previously "formed or expressed an opinion."

C. D. Brigham, Esq., who has for nine years been the managing editor of the Pittsburgh Commercial has disposed of his stock in the concern and resigned his position as editor. Russell Errett, Esq., who, it will be remembered was the very efficient Chairman of the Republican State Central Committee during the campaign of 1872, has been chosen to fill his place. Election Proclamation.

Whereas in and by the 1st Section of the Act of General Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed the 17th day of March, 1862, entitled, "An Act to permit the voters of this Commonwealth to vote every three years upon the question of granting licenses to sell intoxicating liquors, duty is enjoined upon the Sheriff of every county to give notice of such election to be held, and in pursuance thereof, I, T. J. VAN GIESEN, High Sheriff of the county of Forest, do therefore make known and give this public notice to the electors of the said county of Forest, that a special election will be held in the said county on

Monday, February, 24, 1873.

at which time the qualified electors of said county will vote "for license," or "against license," in the manner provided by the 1st section of the aforesaid Act, hereinafter recited: SECTION 1. Be it enacted, &c., That on the third Friday in March, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, in every city and county in this Commonwealth, and at the annual municipal elections every third year thereafter, in every city and county, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors and Judges of elections in the cities and counties, to receive tickets, either written or printed, from the legal voters of said cities and counties, labelled on the outside "license," and on the inside, "for license," "against license," and to deposit said tickets in a box provided for that purpose by said inspectors and judges, as is required by law in the case of other tickets received at said election; and the tickets so received shall be counted, and a return made to the clerk of the court of Quarter Sessions of the peace of the proper county, duly certified and required by law, which certificate shall be laid before the judges of the said court at the first meeting of the said court after said election shall be held, and shall be filed with the other records of the court; and it shall be the duty of the mayors of cities and justices of counties, or any other officer whose duty it may be to give notice, to give due public notice of such special election provided for three weeks previous to the time of holding the same, and also three weeks before such election every third year thereafter: Provided, that this act shall not be construed to repeal or affect any special law providing for the sale of intoxicating liquors, or prohibiting the granting of licenses: Provided, That when the municipal and township elections in any county or city do not occur on the third Friday in March, the election provided for this section shall be held on the day fixed for the municipal elections in said county. And provided further, That all licenses granted after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, shall cease, determine and become void on the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, if the district for which they shall be granted determine against the granting of licenses; and the treasurer of the proper county shall then refund to the holder of such license the moneys so paid therefor, for which the said treasurer shall be entitled to credit in his accounts with the commonwealth.

Sec. 2. That in receiving and counting, and in making returns of the votes of the inspectors and judges, and clerks of said election shall be governed by the laws of this commonwealth regulating general elections; and all the penalties of said election laws are hereby extended to, and shall apply to the clerks, inspectors, judges and clerks, voting in and in attendance upon the elections held under the provisions of this act.

And the qualified electors of the county of Forest will hold their elections in the several districts as follows: In Barnett township at Clarington school house. In Green township at the house of L. Arner. In Jenks township at the house of C. P. Fox. In Tionesta township at the court house in Marion. In Harmony township at Allender school house. In Hickory township at Ball school house. In Kingsley township at Wheeler, Dusenbury & Co's store. In Tionesta township at school house in Tionesta borough. In Tionesta borough at school house in said borough.
