LOCAL AND MISCELLANEOUS.

—Rev. J. S. Stewart, of Oakdale, Pa., will preach in the Presbyterian Church of this place on Sunday, the 16th inst.

—H. W. Roberts and sister are at present enjoying vacation at home. They have for some months been attending the Carrier Seminary.

—Some Western editor describing the money market in his town, describes the status here just about now. He says "Money is close; but not close enough to be reached."

—Horace Lingard's Troupe are to give an entertainment in the Opera House in Titusville to-morrow evening. This is one of the very best comedy troupes traveling.

—It is reported that Mr. H. H. May is to erect a building between the bank and the church during the spring, and that Hilbrunner & Co. will occupy it as a store.

—A bill has passed the house authorizing Forest County to borrow \$8,000.00 for the purpose of building the bridges across the creek at this point and at Lacystown.

—A culvert, arch, or run way, has been built under the railroad bridge across Hunter's Run, and an embankment is being built there to take the place of the trestles. A good idea.

—Mr. Rowland Cobb, late of the lumber firm of John Cobb & Sons, has purchased the residence of J. B. Agnew, on Helen St., and will move in a few days. We welcome all such.

—We learn from the Titusville Herald that Col. J. H. Cogswell's re-appointment as post-master of that city has been confirmed by the Senate. So far as we have heard, Col. Cogswell is a popular and efficient officer.

—As soon as the creek is in shape to run lumber, Knox's Mill will be started up, and lumber will be manufactured as well, and furnished as cheap here as elsewhere. Geo. Sawyer will run the door, sash and blind part of the machinery.

—J. H. Bowman, Esq., erst the editor of Petroleum Monthly, was in town on Saturday last. His time was limited, hence he did not call upon us. The Petroleum Monthly is taking a rest until July, during which time Mr. Bowman is getting up a history of the Oil Regions. We should judge that he could get up a very readable book upon the subject.

—All the ice which, previous to the soft weather, was distributed between here and Warren, is now gorged between this place and Hickory. It is one great gorge, and if it goes off sudden great destruction of property will ensue. The gorge is so high in some places that the R. R. track cannot be seen from the bank on this side of the river. If the ice is melted slowly away all will be safe; but if it goes out with rain, then stand under.

TOTALLY WRECKED.—Yesterday morning Mr. J. D. W. Reck made up his mind to go to the depot, and accordingly started, on the ice. He hadn't progressed far until he changed his mind, by reason of the ice giving way beneath him. He disappeared from mortal sight for a brief space and then reappeared snorting like a locomotive. He made frantic attempts to get out, but the ice gave way beneath his weight. At length with the help of some by-standers who furnished him a plank, Mr. Reck was rescued and took his departure for home. He took it all very cool—in fact, cold, but thinks he will postpone further river baths until the weather is warmer.

—At a court held in Warren last week Judge J. A. Dale got a judgment of \$2,400 against the P. & E. R. R. for injuries received in August, 1870, while a passenger on that road, the particulars of which our readers are familiar with. The case will probably be carried to the Supreme Court, as that is the way the railroad companies generally take, for the purpose of deferring judgment and being as mean as possible.

—No action has yet been taken on the question of a fire-engine, and no more time should be lost. Geo. Sawyer has received an offer of a first-rate hand engine for \$600. He is acquainted with the machine, and says it is a good one, and cheap at the price. We have lately seen how defenseless we were in cases of fire, and steps should be taken at once to put ourselves in proper shape to receive the next one.

—Sheila Van Glezen, J. W. Stroup and Quill McClintock have taken the job of running most of the lumber of Jno. Cobb & Son and Bond Brothers, on the Tionesta creek, to deliver the same in Pittsburgh, and Leonard Agnew is running Cobb's lumber on the Clarion River. All are busy at work, and the business will soon be in full blast. Unless the lumbermen are obliged to take paper for their lumber, we may hope for better times soon.

—To show how lumber is being manufactured in the forests about here, we give the following day's work at Thoa's Run Mill, owned and run by Jno. Cobb & Son: In one day last week they took from the stump, hauled to the mill, sawed, hauled to the bank of Clarion River, and piled 18,000 feet of lumber. This is not an extraordinary day's work in any one branch of the business, but taking it all together, it is a pretty big job. The lumber is said to be as good as any manufactured in the region.

—On Saturday last a case of more than ordinary interest came up before Justice J. D. Porter, before whom a preliminary hearing was had. James Rafferty, of Washington tp, had three indictments preferred against him—one for assault and battery on his wife, the second for refusing to support her, and the third for burning the mill of T. J. Payne, in Farmington tp, in September, 1871. A number of witnesses and citizens from that section were in attendance at the hearing. Rafferty was committed to jail in default of \$500 bail on the first two charges and \$5,000 on the last. Mr. Rafferty has bargained with the Sheriff before—having been sent up by the Court about a year ago for smashing windows and other light conduct.—Clarion Democrat.

RAILROAD ACCIDENTS.—During the past ten years 8,800 people were killed or injured on railways of Great Britain. From 1865 to 1869, inclusive, a period of only five years, over 7,500 persons were killed or injured on the railroads of New York and Pennsylvania alone. These facts show either bad management or gross carelessness on the part of our railroad companies. To protect the traveling public Hon. Andrew King, of Missouri, has introduced into the House a bill to compel all railroads in the United States on and after January 1, 1874, to equip all passenger trains with a power brake, operated by the engineer. This is a step in the right direction.

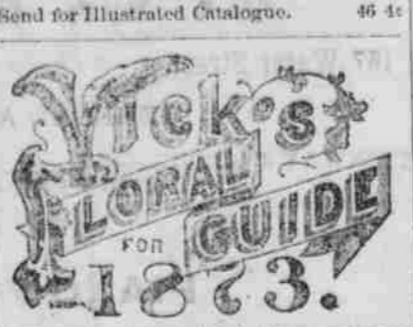

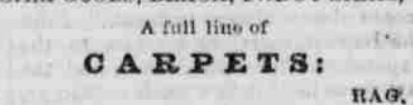
