The annual reunion of the Tenth Regiment Pennsylvania Reserves will be held at New Castle on the 4th of July next. It is desired that surviving members shall attend.

The deer recently caught by Riddle and Hunter, died one day last week. It was very poor, and probably died of starvation, having refused to eat after its capture.
