—We are in receipt of the *Pennsylvania School Report for 1872*. The delight of the age. It should be in every family.
This delightful and refreshing book, combining as it does history, romance, architecture, poetry and algebra is the work of many hands. The various Superintendents of the counties and cities of Pennsylvania have produced a work that commands general admiration, eclipsing all their former efforts in the line of literature. The book, although only issued last winter, has had an unparalleled circulation. Members of the Legislature went to the book cellar—and well loaded cars conveyed this trophy of the age to their districts, which were fairly flooded with it. Fireside homes were made happy feasting over its contents. Added to this, "a new crop" is now in the hands of the county superintendents of the various counties for distribution to those whom the members of the last Legislature may chance to have missed in their disinterested philanthropic efforts to enlighten their constituents.
In this book is pictured to life, the vicissitudes, yearnings, groanings and ailments of the members of Institutes. Sprightly pictures glow on every page that awaken the sympathetic heart and fire the soul in the cause of education.
The book has already (although it is only May) been translated into 27 different languages. 13 copies sent west alone broke up a meditated Sioux outrage and Indian war, and the tribes are now clamorous for education.
We can never sufficiently thank the projectors of this work for the happy influence they have wrought. Time and space do not permit a more lengthy notice, but we conclude by saying that the multitude of fancies that pervade this volume, coupled with its high moral tone, would furnish a first class theme for a high toned artist.

—Geo. S. Hunter, who owned the river bridge which fell last winter, has been having a streak of remarkable bad luck for some time past. During the last flood Hunters Island was almost entirely unfit for agricultural purposes, and on Monday night lost one of his large gray horses died, the other following suit on Tuesday morning.
