PHILADELPHIA, April 23d, 1873. In accordance with our Rules and Regulations, Friday, May 30th, will be observed as a MEMORIAL DAY for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the Graves of Comrades who died in defence of their country during the late Rebellion, or who have since passed away.

The manner of conducting these services is optional with Posts, but those desiring it, can obtain copies of the form of ceremonies, as furnished last year by making immediate application to the A. A. G.

Attention is especially invited at this time to the recommendation from National Headquarters last year, "that flowers and shrubs be planted at each grave, in order that when we are gone, the seasons, in their ceaseless round, may in our stead, adorn the sleeping places of our Comrades."

Last Saturday afternoon a man named Campbell, formerly from New York, but at present residing at Lawrenceburg, fell from the derrick of Capt. Grace's well, on the J. B. Campbell farm, near Karns City, a distance of fifty-six feet, and although seriously injured will recover. Campbell had gone up the derrick ladder for some purpose, and after ascending to the height above mentioned, the board upon which he was standing tilted while he was reaching for a brace and he started on his frightful descent. He was then on the outside of the derrick. In falling he shot through between two of the girts without striking either of them. Workmen on a neighboring well who saw the man fall say he turned over several times, doubling up and straightening out as he hurried to what seemed a sudden and awful death. Five feet above the derrick floor was a pipe leading from the well to the tank, and upon this the man fell, which was the only thing that saved his life. He struck this pipe about mid way between the centre and outside of the derrick, bending it at right angles, and bounding from this to the floor. He was picked up in an insensible condition and carried to the Campbell House. Drs. Willard of Petrolia, and Pettigrew of Karns City, were summoned who examined his injuries and pronounced them as not being necessarily dangerous, to the astonishment of every one. His right hand was badly bruised and he was sprained in the regions of the kidneys, but no bones were broken. Dr. Willard informed us that when visited him on Sunday he was sitting up in bed smoking a cigar and feeling quite comfortable.—Independent.

LIGHTNING RODS AMONG THE ANCIENTS. The Jewish Temple in Jerusalem existed nearly 1,000 years—as the first stood nearly 400, and the last about six hundred years. By its site, this temple was very much exposed to the severe thunder storms whereby Palestine is so often visited. Nevertheless, we find neither in the Bible nor in Josephus that this building was ever struck by lightning. The reason thereof is very simple, for the wise King Solomon was acquainted with the laws of nature, and had made his arrangements purposely, so that the temple was provided with a lightning conductor, which was very near the same as the one invented by Franklin, which is in use by us now. The roof of the temple was covered with heavily gilt cedar-wood, and was provided from end to end with steel bars, whereof the long points were also gilt.—Scientific American.

Week before last Mr. Elijah Bish, of Knox township, while engaged at work on Hopkins' shingle mill, was caught by the saw, receiving very severe injuries. The saw struck him on the hip and side, cutting an ugly gash, and severing a part of the hench bone. We learn that he is getting along very satisfactorily and will recover, although crippled for life. Dr. Sweeney was called.—Brookville Republican.

MEADVILLE, MAY 18.—About 9 o'clock last evening Michael Lalley, day switchman in the freight yard, while returning home, stepped on the main railroad track and noticing the approach of a switch engine stepped over on one of the side track, and was instantly knocked down and run over, sustaining injuries which proved fatal. Mr. Lalley leaves a wife and three children.—Derwick.
