The Assembly Question Again.

Dear Sir:—Several weeks ago, I noticed an article in the FOREST REPUBLICAN, copied from the Oil City Derrick, in which the writer of the article predicted a "free fight" between the several candidates for Assembly, viz: Winans, Williams and the Republican nominee. Since the announcement of Dr. Allison for that position, some of the "unterrified" have become a little shaky, and it is now asserted that either Winans or Williams must leave the course. If Dr. Winans' conferees are of the "weak kneed" Democracy, of course they will desert him at the most critical moment. Would this not be gay for the friends of Williams. But we think it would be rather humiliating for the friends of Winans. It has been alleged that the chairman of the Democratic county committee has matters "all fixed." We are told that the friends of Dr. Winans, who gave him a fair and square nomination, are anxiously awaiting to learn the "fix." There may be arbitrary powers granted to chairmen, yet common courtesy should be extended to the voters who supported the Dr. at the caucus, and placed him on the ticket as their favorite standard bearer. But "let 'em fight it out if it takes all summer."

ODD FELLOWSHIP.
The Grand Lodge of the United States met in the city of Baltimore, Sept. 15. The attendance is numerous, and representatives are present from every jurisdiction in the United States. The Past Grand Sires of Massachusetts, New York, California, the District of Columbia, and Past Grand Sire James B. Nicholson, of Pennsylvania are present.
This is the Legislative Head of Odd Fellowship, and among the important questions that will be presented, some of which are decided, are the following: That of merging the encampment and Lodge Branches of the order; arranging the scale of benefits to correspond with the fees and dues paid in the subordinates; changing the title of the supreme head of the order; changing the official terms in subordinates from six months to one year, which was decided could not be done, and prescribing uniform Lodge regalia.

The following statistics were submitted, showing the increase from 1871 to 1872:

These figures are encouraging to the members of the order, and show its vast and increasing popularity with the masses. Odd Fellowship is an empire whose dominion is not confined to its quarter of a million of members. Not alone does she crown these her votaries with blessings; but through them and by them she constantly adds to the substantial happiness of mankind. Nor is it confined in its results or labors to this country. It has penetrated Germanic Europe, Switzerland, the islands of the Pacific, and Australia, and is destined in the near future to benefit and bless the whole habitable globe.

At the Re-union of the Army of the Cumberland at Pittsburgh, speeches were made by President Grant, Gen. Sherman, Sheridan, Hooker, McDowell, Baird and Governor Hartmann. It was an exceedingly brilliant affair. The oration of Durbin Ward, Lebanon, Ohio, was a master-piece of soldierly scholarship and manly patriotism. His appeal for Amnesty elicited loud applause, and his noble suggestions for the Centennial deserves to be treasured by all true Americans. It is this: "On that natal morn let the South and the North sit down together on the old benches in Independence Hall, and take the sacrament of reconciliation. Let us of the Union armies invite our old occasion foes to meet us at that ancient fane of freedom, and there in the holy ground consecrated to brotherly love bury our dead strifes eternally out of sight."
If the assemblies of civilians would evince the same spirit as these "men of war," the millenium of politics would not be far distant.
