The Assembly Question--A new way to Maintain the Rights of Forest County.

Mr. Siggins was one of the conferees of Forest county in the memorable Fryburg conference, and knows he in common with the others, was not treated with ordinary decency considering the position he occupied, but, with the other Forest conferees was entirely ignored!
