GOLDEN AND SILVER JELLY CAKE.

GOLDEN CAKE.—Take the yolks of eight eggs, well beaten, add cup white sugar, one-half cup of butter, one-half cup of sweet milk, and one and three-quarters cups flour, having in it one-half measure Banner Baking Powder.
