Thanksgiving Proclamation.

PENNSYLVANIA, ss: In the name and by the authority of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, John F. Hartranft, Governor of said Commonwealth.

Whereas, The President of the United States, by his proclamation, has appointed the twenty-seventh day of November next as a day of thanksgiving.

I do, therefore, recommend that the people of Pennsylvania, in accordance with said proclamation, shall meet on said day, in their respective places of worship, to return thanks to Almighty God for the manifold mercies He has vouchsafed to us during the past year, and to implore a continuance of His favor, and to pray that the afflicted people of other of these United States may be delivered from the pestilence which is within their borders.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of the State, at Harrisburg, this 30th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and of the Commonwealth of the ninety-eighth.

—The following items we clip from the Brookville Republican:

We learn that a man employed by Ex-Sheriff Carrier as hostler, fell from the hay mow on Saturday evening last, receiving severe injuries. A report was circulating that his neck was broken, but this was incorrect.

On Tuesday of last week, Mr. Peter Baum, while engaged at hauling coal from Reynoldsville, was thrown off the wagon in the vicinity of Deemer's saw mill, the wagon passing over his leg, breaking it just above the ankle. His injury is quite serious and will confine him at home for some time.

Charles Bloomgreen, a Swede, while employed to-day, (Thursday) at moving a load of furniture, when in the neighborhood of the school house at Milehill, on the Reynoldsville road, the team ran off, throwing him out of the wagon and among a mass of

rocks, where he was found shortly afterwards, his head being fearfully cut and almost scalped. Dr. Saecny was called, and reports the case favorable although very serious.

On Monday evening a desperate fight took place in the lot to the rear of our office, between a gambler who had been playing "three card monte" in one of the stables, and two other men named McGeeger and Brown. It transpires that the latter had risked their money on the game, and losing it, of course, they proposed recovering it by pummeling the "slight of hand performer," and right well did they do the job. In the melee two of the men fell from the porch of one of the back buildings, a distance of about twelve feet, and narrowly escaped serious injury. This seemed to be a contest between roughs, and though rough and brutal, called for little sympathy from the moral portion of our community.

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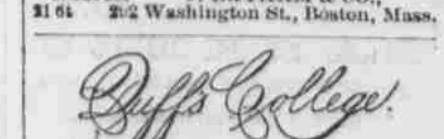
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
