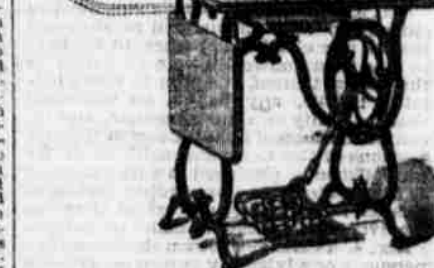

ward, as provided in this constitution. Sec. 25. The Philadelphia magistracy, in lieu of aldermen, shall be chosen as required in this constitution at the election in said city for city and ward officers. In the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, the magistracy shall be chosen on the first Monday of April succeeding their election.

Sec. 26. All persons in office in this Commonwealth at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall continue in office until their successors shall be duly qualified, unless otherwise provided in this constitution.

Sec. 27. The seventh article of this constitution, prescribing the mode of electing county officers, shall be amended so that the term of office shall be for one year, and shall terminate on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

Sec. 28. The terms of office of county commissioners and county auditors chosen prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, shall terminate on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and shall expire on that day.

Sec. 29. All State, county, city, ward, borough, and township officers in office at the time of the adoption of this constitution, whose commissions are not provided for by statute, shall continue to exercise their respective offices until the expiration of their respective terms of office.

Sec. 30. All State and judicial officers heretofore elected, sworn, affirmed, or in office when this constitution shall take effect, shall severally, within one month after such adoption, take and subscribe an oath (or affirmation) to support this constitution.

Sec. 31. The words 'County Commissioners' wherever used in this constitution, shall mean and be construed to mean the County Commissioners of the County of Philadelphia, and in any ordinance or resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the City of Philadelphia, shall mean the Board of Supervisors of the City of Philadelphia.

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ARTICLE XV. CITIES AND TOWNSHIPS. Sec. 1. Cities may be chartered, whenever a majority of the electors of a borough having a population of at least ten thousand shall vote at any general election in favor of the same.

ARTICLE XVI. PRIVATE CORPORATIONS. Sec. 1. All existing charters, or grants of special or exclusive privileges, under which a bona fide organization shall not have taken place and business conducted, shall remain in force until the adoption of this Constitution, shall thereafter have no validity.

Sec. 2. The General Assembly shall not repeal the charter of any corporation now existing, or alter or amend the same, or pass any other general or special law for the benefit of such corporation, except on condition that such corporation shall thereafter hold its charter subject to the provisions of this Constitution.

Sec. 3. No corporation shall have the right of eminent domain, shall never be abridged or so construed as to prevent the General Assembly from taking the property and franchises of incorporated companies, and the power of the State shall never be abridged or so construed as to prevent the General Assembly from exercising its power in such manner as to infringe the equal rights of individuals or the general well being of the State.

Sec. 4. In all elections for directors or managers of a corporation each member or shareholder may cast the whole number of his votes for one candidate, or distribute them upon two or more candidates, as he may prefer.

Sec. 5. No foreign corporation shall do any business in this Commonwealth, except by or through its authorized agent or agents in this Commonwealth, and such agent or agents shall be sworn to and qualified in the same manner as if they were citizens of this Commonwealth.

Sec. 6. No corporation shall have the right to sue or be sued, or to hold real estate, except as may be necessary and proper for its legitimate business.

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ARTICLE XVII. EDUCATION. Sec. 1. The General Assembly shall provide for the maintenance and support of a thorough and efficient system of public schools, wherein all the children of the State shall be educated, and shall appropriate at least one million dollars each year for that purpose.

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
