Shortly before five n'clock last Thursday evening William Grassart and Hagh McKay of Mendville started for a heat ride from the north side of island N . 2, taking with them three boys, Andrew Grassart, Willie Davis and James Grassart. Passing up the stream they reached a point above the bridge, leading from the above island to Huidekoper's island. There the curr at struck them, and swept them down to very near the bridge where a projecting post caught the boat, over-turning it, leaving five human beings struggling in the swift current. Grassart presped his young son, James, and reached the shore with bim in safety. McKay made every effort to save one of the other boys, but failed. Willie Davis and Andrew Grassart aged seven and nine years were swept far down by the current, and both drowned. The last seen of them was by a woman living near the lower end of the Island. One was floating, apparently lifeless, and the other throwing up his arms in the last spasms of drowning agony.

A private letter from Sharon, Pa., dated the 8th, gives the particulars of the drowning at that place, on the cay previous, of three persons. The writer says: "A sad accident happened at this place yesterday at nine o'clock. A few weeks ago the bridge accross the river at this point was swept a vay by the high water, and a ferry boat was rigge lup to carry people across the stream, Yesterday morning, when the heat had reached the middle of Court House.
