

The age of the deceased was apparently 63 years; he was dressed coarsely, but warmly; the toes of both feet had been amputated, as also the fourth finger of his right hand, and he had been blind of the right eye. No marks of violence were discovered upon the body, but an empty whisky bottle found lying by his side possibly tells the dread tale of his death.

The above is the finding of a coroner's jury in the case of an unknown corpse found in a deserted house near Cresson, on the Central railroad. It contains a most eloquent temperance lecture.

An insane colored woman created some excitement on Liberty street on Tuesday evening. She attempted to kill a child in the afternoon and ferociously attacked her brother in law who interposed to save the child. Her screams on the street drew a large crowd. She was temporarily placed in jail for safe keeping, and will probably be sent to the Dixmont Asylum.

From the Indiana Progress we clip the following: "On Thursday night last, Mr. William C. Leasure, of South Mahoning township, when on his way home from visiting a neighbor, fell into Plum creek and was drowned. It is supposed from the indications that as he was stepping down from the bank of the creek onto the plank that crosses, his feet slipped from under him and he fell into the creek, which at that place is very deep, and was drowned. His body was not found until the next day.

It is with regret we learn that Mrs. Shaw, wife of Hon. Richard Shaw, residing on the opposite side of the river from this place, was necessitated to have her left lower arm amputated, on Wednesday of last week. Mrs. S. has, for a long time, been afflicted with a cancer on her left hand, which recently became so painful as to preclude all rest or sleep, either day or night. After consultation, she decided to submit to amputation as the only hope of gaining rest and freedom from pain, and the prologation of life. The operation was performed by Dr. M. M. Farlan, of Philadelphia, assisted by Dr. F. M. Scheurer, of this place. The patient is getting along well, is free from any undue pain, with a fair prospect of a speedy recovery.
