

The following items are taken from the Venango Spectator.

A half-crazy fellow who has been running about the oil region for a month or so, calling himself Captain Sandy, swam the Allegheny river at Oil City, and back again, one of the coldest days of last week. He is scarred with bullets and knives from head to foot and claims to have received his wounds in fights with the Indians. His latest exploit would indicate that he was not to be drowned or frozen to death.

The woolen mill at Kittanning was entirely destroyed by fire, and the residence of William Follock, adjoining, was badly damaged, on Wednesday of last week. The loss is estimated at twenty-five thousand dollars, fully covered by insurance. The editor of the Armstrong Republican closes his account of the fire by saying, "Our water works saved the town, and they have more than paid the cost of construction at this fire."

A remarkable adventure and wonderful escape happened to a horse belonging to W. R. Crawford, Esq., of this city, on Thursday last. Mr. C. drove the animal to the Foster farm, some five miles below town, and left him hitched in the woods on the steep river hill. During his absence, the horse broke the hitching strap and started to follow his owner. His course was along a steep and almost impassable path along the hill. This rough route he managed to traverse, over logs and stumps, some of them six feet high—drawing the buggy after him, until he could get no farther. There was a precipice to the left, over which the horse jumped down fully twenty-five feet perpendicular, and then rolled over and over down a steep bank nearly to the river's edge, seventy-five feet more.

Mr. Crawford expected to find his horse a mass of bruised flesh and broken bones, but he did not appear to be seriously injured. He was placed on his feet, the shattered buggy repaired with ropes and straps, and Mr. Crawford drove him back to the city on Tuesday afternoon. The horse is a great favorite and a valuable animal. His groom says he will be all right in a few days.

B. J. Reid, Esq., attorney at law, who has been a resident of our city for some years, left us yesterday for Erie, where he will engage in the practice of his profession. Mr. Reid is a fine lawyer and a gentleman of culture. We regret that he has gone from this city. He is a man of unblemished character, conscientious and faithful in the discharge of his duty, true to his clients and to all who ever entrusted him with business. We trust he will prosper in his new field of labor as he certainly deserves to.—Titusville Courier.

The Spaniards in Cuba are evidently weakening in their devotion to war, and the leading Havana journal is advocating propositions looking to the establishment of peace. This is no doubt intended to sound public opinion; but it may be readily seen in advance that the Cubans will utterly refuse to accept their conditions. Those of a political nature are, that confiscated estates shall be restored, the Spanish rule in the island recognized, and the Cubans permitted to elect deputies to represent them in the Cortes. This will not be agreed to by the Cubans.

D. D. Williams, Cashier of the Connetquotville (Pa.) National Bank, which was reported robbed some weeks ago, was re-arrested in Erie on Friday by S. B. Benson, Government detective, and lodged in jail, his bail having surrendered him. On the morning of the reported robbery he was found in the bank, gagged and senseless. A recent examination of the bank books shows a defalcation of \$27,000, in addition to the reported robbery of \$17,000, which caused suspicions of Williams' guilt.—Gazette.

The Off City Derrick of last Monday gives an account of a fight among a lot of Allegheny river raftmen, coming up in the cats. After drinking whisky to excess they commenced fighting near Brady's Bend, and one man who was attacked by the others drew a dirk, and before the fight was over he stabbed two men. The injured persons were put off at Parker, and the man who did the cutting went up on the train.

The last case of conscience coming to our notice is that of a man who bought a suit of clothes from a Beaver township merchant, last summer, and gave in payment an order with the name of a lumberman forged to it. Recently the fellow sent the money for the clothes, saying his conscience troubled him and he was trying to lead a better life. When conversion is followed by such acts there is reason to believe it genuine.—Clarion Democrat.

The President is reported to have in preparation a message on the subject of Cuba. If this proves to be true, we will doubtless have a declaration of some kind in behalf of the long suffering Cubans. That his sympathies are with them is beyond peradventure. Their long continued and brave struggle, their gradually increasing success, the terrible baptism of suffering and blood, certainly entitle this people to the boon for which they are struggling. We hope the President may have for them words of encouragement and cheer.

The Cambridge Index says that on Tuesday morning last, shortly after repairing to work in the woods, Mr. D. W. Barber, who resides about one mile above Cambridge near the A. & G. W. track, discovered that his house, a two story frame, was on fire. He immediately returned but as the roof was extensively on fire, any thought of putting it out single handed was impracticable but with the assistance of his family the greater part of his house-hold goods were saved. He was insured \$400 on the house and \$200 on furniture.
