#### ABRAHAM LINCOLN'S DREAM.

On the afternoon of the day on which the President was shot, there was a cabinat council, at which Secre-tary Stanton presided. Mr. Stanton then noticed, with great surprise, that the President sat with an air of dignity in his chair, instead of rolling about in the most ungainly attitudes, as his invariable custom was, and that instead of telling irrelevant and questionable stories he was grave and calm, and quite a different man. ness," suddenly raising his face and looking round the table as Mr. Stanton entered. "Let us proceed to business, gentlemen." Mr. Stanton and the attorney-gener-


