

The bill presented by Senator Anderson, of Crawford, in reference to the storage and transportation of oil, and the issue of certificates, etc., is rather an interesting bill to those engaged in the trade. In substance, it provides that no certificate shall be given unless the party has the oil actually stored; no second certificate shall be given unless the first is cancelled; no oil shall be delivered except upon the surrender of the first certificate. The certificates shall be transferable when endorsed, no oil shall be removed from any place of storage—except in case of fire or flood—without the written consent of the owner. Every corporation is also required on or before the 10th day of each month to make a report of the stock on hand and where located, which statement shall be sworn to; how much they are liable for the delivery of at the close of the month; how much oil was received during the month and where from; how much delivered and where to; what kind of transportation was used. They shall also make quarterly reports to the Bureau of Industrial Statistics at Harrisburg.

Railroad companies are put under like conditions as to the transportation of refined or crude petroleum. The penalty for giving a false certificate is not less than \$1,000 and imprisonment not exceeding a year; the penalty for removing oil without permission is the same; the penalty for not reporting is a fine of \$1,000 and \$500 each day that the report is kept back.

The thirteenth annual session of the Good Templars Convention of Erie, Warren, Crawford, Venango, Cameron, Mercer, Forest, Elk and McKean, will be held in the City of Union, commencing May 10th at eleven o'clock A. M., to continue at the will of the convention. The circulars say that the citizens and members of the Order in Union City are noted for their hospitality and all may expect a generous and hearty welcome. The circular continues: "Never before in the history of this organization has there been a time when the temperance cause assumed such gigantic proportions as at the present. The grand tidal wave that had its inception in Ohio (Fredonia N. Y.) has spread in every direction, gathering strength with its progress, until it has stirred the inmost depths of the moral heart of the nation. At length a cry has gone up which has penetrated to the throne of the Supreme Ruler of the Universe."

Last week James Saeger, the leader of the gang of burglars who robbed Mr. Benninghoff, some six years ago, of bonds and currency to the amount of \$500,000, was arrested in Colorado by the Chief of the Rocky Mountain Detectives. Chief of Police House, of Titusville, was notified by telegraph of the arrest, and on Friday proceeded to Harrisburg and obtained a requisition from Governor Hartman upon the Governor of Colorado for the body of Saeger. Mr. House left Harrisburg on Saturday evening for Denver, and expects to return with Saeger by the first of next week. From dispatches received by Mr. House from the detective who arrested Saeger it appears that he has been residing in the territory for nearly three years and owns a large amount of real estate and valuable interests in silver mines. When arrested he acknowledged his name and readily resigned to the situation.

James Elgin's body has been found. It will be remembered that he was drowned over a month ago, in the Clarion river, below Callensburg. Fruitless search was made for his body until last Friday evening, when persons on board a steamboat on the Allegheny river, near Phillipsburg, saw a body floating and called to two men on a raft who took a skiff and brought the body to the wharf at Phillipsburg. Alex. McGiffin Esq., summoned a jury and held an inquest. The body was recognized as that of James Elgin, of Scotch Hill. His friends were telegraphed to, and they came for his remains, and interred them at Reidsburg on Monday.—Clarion Democrat.

The army reunion proposed to be held at Harrisburg on the 11th, 12th, 13th of the present month, promises to be a very interesting event. Lieutenant General Sherman is President, and a long list of the most celebrated Generals of the war is announced as representing those who will be present. These army reunions are agreeable occasions, and serve to keep alive a feeling of interest among those who fought the battles of the war, and to inspire a sense of patriotic pride within. We are gratified that the affair arranged for Harrisburg promises so favorably.

The report that the proprietors of the Exchange Hotel, this city, intended closing the house, because of the temperance demonstration, is without any foundation in truth. The proprietors wish to see their applications for license last week for the purpose of the experiment of running a first-class hotel on temperance principles, and every effort will be made to maintain the reputation of the hotel as the best in Northwestern Pennsylvania.—Venango Citizen.
