HEADQUARTERS G. A. R., PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 8th, 1874 } Saturday, May 30th, has been designated by the rules and regulations and by custom, as the day upon which all members of the Grand Army of the Republic shall assemble to pay their annual floral tribute to the memory of their dead comrades.

Let the observance of this beautiful and touching memorial ceremony be marked by the usual solemnity and remitting for a time your cares and labors, reverently dedicate the day to doing honor to the silent army of the dead with whose Hosts we ourselves must soon be marshalled, and in making acknowledgment to the Supreme Ruler for preserving to us the blessings of free government.

It is earnestly hoped that civic and military associations, churches and Sunday schools will participate in this ceremony and that wherever no Posts of the Grand Army exist, these citizens will perform fitting services so that the grave of an deceased soldier may be neglected.

The Brookville Republican has the following items:

On Thursday afternoon last, Moses Livingston, car inspector at Brookville station, was found drowned in Red Bank creek. Some boys passing along the bank of the creek below the depot discovered clothing on the beach, and at once communicated the fact to other parties, when search discovered the body of Mr. Livingston, he having been in the water for some hours. During the afternoon he borrowed a towel from some of the employees at the depot and went to the creek to bathe, when from some unknown cause, doubtless cramp, he was drowned. He was an industrious young man, formerly a resident of Indiana, Pa., and on Friday he was taken to that place for burial.

On Thursday night last, the store of Mr. A. J. Smathers, at Belview was entered by burglars, and goods to the amount of about \$500 carried off. The building was entered by the same process practiced at Kauxdale and at Dowlingville, the door cut and sprung open with an instrument made purposely for the business. The parties were traced to near what is supposed their hiding place, and hopes are entertained that they may be discovered. This is the second attempt on Mr. Smathers' store, a window having been removed last winter, but the burglars were driven off before they accomplished their purpose by the arrival of parties returning from an evening meeting.

Thursday morning last, some gentlemen were trying a sporting gun owned by Mr. K. L. Blood, in the rear of his store, firing at a mark on the ground, when a gentleman stepped up and asked for the privilege of a shot, which was given him. Taking the gun he took aim at a knot hole in the stable on the rear of the lot and fired, without causing any alarm amongst the party, which soon retired. Very soon after it was discovered that the ball had passed into the stable, striking a horse belonging to Messrs. Clover and Larimer in the neck, cutting the jugular vein, from which the animal is not very heavy, but the circumstances should be a warning against the use of fire arms in the borough. A human being might as easily have been the victim as the poor old gray nag.

Rumors were rife in railroad circles last week that the Oil Creek Railroad from Oil City to Corry was to be discontinued and the rails torn up. On dit these arrangements were made at a meeting of the Directors of the Oil Creek road, which concluded yesterday, with Tom Scott and C. Vanderbilt. The Valley road, under the virtual control of Tom Scott, will continue by the river division of the Oil Creek road to Irvinville, while C. Vanderbilt, with his Donkirk & Pittsburgh road, will be allowed to have the full control of Titusville and traffic.—Derrick.

Last Thursday afternoon, while James Morgan, Ed. Bergwin, and three other small boys were playing with a pistol it exploded, suddenly discharging its contents in the face of James Morgan, a young lad, aged about eleven years. The charge entered a little below the left eye, taking

an upward course. He was taken home and medical aid summoned. The doctor was unable to extract the ball, and at once pronounced it a very serious, if not fatal case. At present the boy is still living and doing as well as could be expected, yet it is not at all probable that he will entirely recover. Two accidents by shooting in one day should certainly be a warning against allowing children to carry deadly weapons, not only endangering their own lives but the lives of others. —Venango Citizen.
