A meeting of the owners of the Oil Creek and Allegheny River consolidated seven per cent, bonds, the May interest on which was defaulted, was held in Philadelphia on Tuesday. It appears that, by the terms of the mortgage under which the bonds were issued, one-fourth of the bondholders can, within three calendar months of the non-payment of the semi-annual interest, empower the trustees to take charge of the road, and a resolution was offered and adopted requesting these officers at once to institute the legal proceedings necessary to bring the road into the market for the benefit of the holders of the consolidated bonds. These securities amount to \$1,000,000. Most of the bonds are held in Philadelphia.—Pittsburgh Commercial.

-The resignation of Secretary Richardson, and the appointment of Gen. Bristow as Secretary of the Treasury, seems to be accepted favorably, as re-gards the fact of change. Yet the new appointee must win confidence for himself in actual service. He is a lawyer, not known to be skilled in finance, and yet may succeed in making a good Treasury official. It is a singular fact that skill in the management of large fiscal concerns of a private or even public nature, does not always prepare for the administration of the Treasury Department of the United States. On the other hand, inexperience is not fatal to success. Chase, Boutwell, or Fessenden, were not practical financiers, yet they were good financial Secretaries. McCulloch was thus skilled, and was a poor Secretary. So Bristow may be a success. -Pitteburgh Gazette,
