This Congressional District is composed of Indiana, Armstrong, Clarion, Jefferson and Forest counties, Each county is eptitled to three delegates in in the District nominating convention. The delegates of Forest county were appointed at a meeting of the county committee during May court, and were instructed 1st, for White, of Indiana, 2d, for Maclay of Clarion, and 3d for Marlin of Jefferson. Next Clarion county held her primary meetings, and instructed her delegates for Campbell. Then Indiana at her primary meetings instructed for White. Jefferson instructed for Marlin, and Armstrong county instructed 1st, for Benle, and 2d, for White.
