The Corner Stone of the State Hospital for the Insane of the District composed of the Counties of Crawford, Clarion, Erie, Elk, Forest, Jefferson, Mercer, McKean, Venango and Warren, is to be laid by Governor Hartranft, on the grounds near the town of Warren, on the Tenth Day of September, 1874, at 12 o'clock M.

He lost a leg at the battle of Gettysburg, and since he has been out of office he has been financially embarrassed and discouraged, which brought about a state of mind resulting in him shooting himself twice in the breast with a revolver. He was living at last accounts, but no hopes are entertained of his recovery.

—Col. Thomas is still burning brick. He has quite a large quantity on hand and is getting more ready to burn. So many new houses are going up, we hope to see brick taken instead of studding and weather boards, soon. The Colonel has taken the initiatory steps by getting the brick on the ground for his new dwelling on the lot opposite the Sheriff's house. He will not commence to build before next summer.
