GEO. A. JENKS.

"It is the government of Lincoln I have to deal with. As to the government of Jefferson Davis, I have nothing to say."—Extract from speech of Geo. A. Jenks.

The speech from which the above extract is taken, was made in Clarion, during the war. The occasion, we believe, was a Democratic political meeting.

After expressing himself as above Mr. Jenks went on to abuse Lincoln's Government, to cry down the war, to discourage enlistments, and in fact to do what he could to create a feeling against the Federal Government under Lincoln's administration. But, "As to the government of Jefferson Davis, I have nothing to say!" What is the inference? Why, that Lincoln's government, with which he had to deal, which was in favor of preserving the Union at all hazards, was all wrong, and, consequently, that the government of Jefferson Davis, which was deluging the earth with blood to destroy the Union, against which Mr. Jenks "had nothing to say," was all right. We are given to understand that every political speech made by Mr. Jenks during the war, had the same tendency. And yet we are asked to scratch the name of Harry White, who served with honor under "the Lincoln Government" in the army, from the first treasonable outbreak to the close of the war, and to vote for Geo. A. Jenks, who had no fault to find with Jefferson Davis' Government! War Democrats are you prepared to vote for the man who, while you were fighting for the Union, was doing everything to discourage your efforts, and doing all in his power to cripple "the government of Mr. Lincoln," in its efforts to suppress treason and save the Union? Mr. Conyer you were in the army, fighting against the very government with which Mr. Jenks could find no fault, shoulder to shoulder with the "Lincoln minions" for whom he scarce could find words to express his contempt; are you ready to forget this, and support for an important office, the man who was not for you, and therefore, virtually, was against you? You may consider yourself bound, as a member of the Democratic party to do so, but your heart is not, cannot be, in the work. No matter where you find one of the boys in blue, whether in one party or the other, he can never forget that class of people who labored at home to make his patriotism, his sacrifices, his sufferings in the cause of the Union of no avail. It is just possible that some of them may support Geo. A. Jenks for Congressional Representative of this District, but they will hate themselves while they do it. They know that they are breaking a vow, made in times when blood flowed like water, and human lives were cut down like grass before the scythe, that they would never

support a man for any position, whose sympathy, and aid and comfort, was granted the cause for which they fought. Geo. A. Jenks is this man! Are you ready to forget all and support him? Every speech made by this man during the great struggle in which you took part, was against the government, against drafts, against enlistments, against drafts, against everything, in fact, except Jefferson Davis' Government; against that he had "nothing to say." If those whose sympathy and aid, and blood, was given to aid the government in the late war, can forgive Geo. A. Jenks, and support him, then, we, like George, "have nothing to say," because they are given over to their idols.

Several of the Southern newspapers have been abusing the Louisville Courier Journal for its plain language on the subject of the recent disturbances. It hits back at them in this way: "The Southern people might as well recognize now the fact that we can unite among ourselves in keeping the peace. For the first time since the war our local authorities, our Governors, our judges, our grand juries are thoroughly aroused, and while their activity comes too late to save us the Fall elections, it gives the country at large a guarantee of the beginning of a new era, whose policy, if it be adhered to, will ultimately bring us out of the woods. In the mean time it seems to us to be more important to support the movement of Gov. Leslie in Kentucky and Gov. Brown in Tennessee by the organization of an adequate public sentiment than to rub a little goose-grease over our sores thinking to conceal them by the vain hope of current partisan successes."

The Democracy of New York have nominated Samuel J. Tilden for Governor. This is probably the best they could make, but is one that will be sure to be beaten. The Democracy is very greatly divided, and the fight in Convention was bitter and short.

Political virtue ought always to be commended. The Democrats have nominated William H. Dimmock for President Judge of the Wayne and Pike district,—the very man who was compelled to resign his seat in the Legislature last Winter because of his impudence in the bank swindle.
