The Derrick of Tuesday contains an account of the suicide of an unknown man, by throwing himself under a moving train on the Jamestown & Franklin Ry., at Summit; four miles below Franklin. The case is shrouded in mystery.

Willie, youngest child of M. W. Tate, Esq., died, of diphtheria on Thursday of last week. The child was a little over ten months old, and was a very interesting and beautiful one. The parents have the sympathy of the entire community.

We are pained to record the death of Mr. C. C. Minneley, agent of P. Minnie & Co., of Erie, which occurred at President, on Monday last. It appears that he put up at the President Hotel on Friday evening, and in the morning, about 7 o'clock, the landlord knocked at his door; Mr. M. answered, and the landlord went down stairs. After waiting for some time, he went up again and knocked, and hearing no answer he opened the door, and found Mr. Minneley lying on his face on the floor, unconscious. He was put into bed and Dr. Hunter of this place was sent for; Mr. McCray's folks in the meantime doing all they could to help the stricken man. When the Dr. arrived he pronounced it a stroke of paralysis. Everything possible was done for the unfortunate man, but without avail, and he died as above stated. He leaves a wife and family, who reside at Linesville, Crawford county. All of our business men were well acquainted with the deceased, and heard of his death with genuine regret. We have been intimately acquainted with Mr. Minneley for many years, and have always known him as an upright business man, whose word could be depended upon at all times and under all circumstances. He was socially inclined, and always made friends wherever business called him. His family have our heartfelt sympathy in their affliction.

The express train which has heretofore run on the river division of the O. C. & A. R. Ry., has been taken off, and hereafter we shall have to travel entirely on accommodation trains, or in other words, at the tail end of freight trains. This is a severe blow, but we don't know how it is to be bettered. It is certain that the express trains have not been patronized very extensively, especially since the hard times shut down on the country. A new time table went into effect on Monday last. Court Proceedings.

Courts met at 2 p. m. Sept. 28, '74. Hon. L. D. Wetmore, President, and Hons. J. A. Proper and A. Cook, Associates. Continued in session till Friday at 2 p. m., transacting a large amount of business, when they adjourned.

True bills were found in the following cases by the Grand Jury: Commonwealth vs. Powell Reisinger and Pauline Reisinger his wife; indictment assault and battery, Evans prosecutor—tried; verdict guilty; sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 to Commonwealth and costs of prosecution. Same vs. Simon Reisinger same prosecutor, verdict guilty, and sentenced to pay costs and 61 cents fine. Same vs. John Ditweller, indictment forgery; continued. Same vs. Byron Landers, fornication and bastardy, Zeruah A. Anderson prosecutrix; guilty; sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 to the Com., \$25 for lying in expenses, and to give bonds in \$700 with two sufficient sureties to Overseers of Poor of Harmony township for maintenance of child; that he pay \$1.50 per week for the period of 2 years from 3d of May 1874, and \$2 per week thereafter for 4 years, quarterly in advance. Same vs. H. R. Stroup, obtaining lodgings under false representations, D. Black prosecutor; not guilty, and prosecutor pay costs.

The following civil cases were disposed of: Wm. H. Lowrie vs. A. Cook et al, ejectment; plaintiff takes nonsuit.

F. H. Ellsworth and Sophia M. Ellsworth vs. J. H. Dilks and Jones, ejectment; verdict for defendants.

Hill, Fox & Co. for use vs. G. S. Hunter, summons in trespass on the case sur assumpsit; plaintiff takes nonsuit, with leave to take it off on cause shown at next term.

J. M. Kepler vs. Alex. Wallace, sum in trespass sur assumpsit; verdict for plaintiff for \$1,226.10.

Ed. Jones vs. C. S. Richardson et al terre tenants, ejectment; verdict for plaintiff for land described in writ, to be released upon the payment within eight months from the date of verdict for \$536.95.

Balance of cases were continued. W. H. James Esq., of Franklin, and A. W. Correll Esq., of Tidioute, were admitted to practice in the several courts of Forest county.

Eli Berlin, of Whig Hill, lost his pocket-book containing a goodly roll of greenbacks, and several notes, on Saturday last. He was very much cast down about it until he stepped into his wagon to go home, and lo! there was the book, with contents intact. We'll venture to say that Eli never felt better since he received the Democratic nomination for County Commissioner.

The political machinery of this county is somewhat deranged. We have a regular Republican, and a regular Democratic candidate for Assembly, and an independent candidate on both sides. The friends of the regular Republican candidate think the probabilities are that the plurality of candidates will have the effect to increase rather than diminish his majority.

May, Park & Co. have put up a very tasteful desk in their bank, outside the counter, for the convenience of the patrons of that institution. The desk is of black walnut, supported by large brackets sawed in beautiful curves, arches, convex and concave circles, all of which were executed by Jas. Hulings, who has a taste for such things and can get them up in good shape.

Chestnuts in small quantities are now in market, and retail at five cents a glass or twenty cents a quart. There is a good crop this year, but the chestnuts are infested with worms to the extent of about one in five. We have heard of no accidents resulting from the chestnut crop this season.
