LOCAL AND MISCELLANEOUS.

The hunters can now pursue their game without fear of knocking over two or three candidates every time they shoot at a deer. A man is constructing a trout pond near Titusville. And there is no better chance to make money at it there than here. The work on Collins & Holbrook's mill at Lacystown is being rushed through with vigor. Mr. Jas. Gillilan is superintending the job. Venison in quarters, halves, and the whole "critter," is offered for sale every few days in town. Some of it is as fat as ordinary beef, and not half so take. Robinson's lamp post got demoralized just before "Holler Eve," much to the disgust of the small boys about town, who had contracted that job themselves. The mules that took passage with Jos. Cameron & Co., for Pittsburgh, proved troublesome customers, and were landed at President, and came back the overland route. No circus has visited our town this season, and yet the times resemble very much the interval for a week or two after the visit of one of these exhibitions. An entire new coat of plastering is being put on the Presbyterian Church, because, when closely examined, the old plastering was found to be in danger of falling off. Regular preaching in the M. E. Church on Sunday morning next. And there will probably be services either in the Presbyterian or Methodist Church in the evening. The first snow storm of the season occurred on Saturday last, and the ground was covered to the depth of about two inches. There has been little sports of snow before, but it didn't "lay." The Corry Republican office was badly damaged by fire last week. A good deal of the material was burned, but the proprietors managed to get out a paper on time, but it was a half-sheet. The hunting party we mentioned last week, as having gone to Balltown, brought in three deer that we know of, and perhaps some that we didn't know of. The season seems to be favorable for large game. Criswell Johnson is to start an oyster saloon in the Smearbaugh building, north of Tate's law office. He proposes to dish this bivalve up in all styles, and we hope he may succeed in making a good living out of it. Judge Dale having purchased the vacant field south of his residence, is having the river-bank in front of it ripped, in good shape, so that he will not hereafter be at the mercy of the floods. A good idea. The stump machine business flourishes again. Groves will probably have seventy-five machines completed when spring opens; and we understand that the demand will be fully up to the supply.

COUNTY ELECTIONS.

The elections for this Borough and Tionesta township, held at the school house in this place yesterday, were as orderly as any election we ever attended. No rows disturbed the harmony of the scene; no scent of whiskey tainted the air. Not even a jangle or quarrel, which are familiarly associated in the minds of the people, with election day, disturbed the harmony of the scene. True, there was button-boling; true there was log-rolling; true there was heavy electioneering; but all was conducted quietly and decently. The election officers of both township and borough locked themselves in the school house, and had the ballots handed in through the windows. So it was when the vote was counted, the doors were still locked; but everybody was satisfied, because there were men of both parties on both boards, and they could be trusted to watch each other.

The following is the result of the election from all the districts in this county except Barnett and Howe: State Ticket, 9 Republican maj. Judiciary, Supreme Judge, tie. Dale, for Associate Judge, 8 maj. Jenks, Democratic candidate for Congress, 58 maj. Wians, Democratic candidate for Assembly 13 maj. Setley, Republican candidate for Treasurer, about 50 maj. Berlin, Democratic candidate for County Commissioner about 80 maj.

In explanation of these figures, we would say that four townships in the above report, came "by word of mouth," which the official figures may change. The whole Republican ticket in this county will be ahead when the official returns are received, with the exception of Congress and Commissioner.

We will publish the full official returns next week. Just as we go to press, we hear from Howe twp. In counting, this must be taken from or added to the above count as may be proper.

Republican State and Judicial ticket, White, Dale, Heath and Cobb, 9 votes each. Agnew 15; Setley 17. The Democratic State and Judicial ticket, Jenks, Siggins, Berlin, and Albaugh 19 each. Wians 13, Hunt 11.

LATEST.—Barnett has given 40 Republican majority on the whole ticket.

Mr. H. proposes to go into the business of sheep raising, and we have no doubt but he will make a good thing of it. He will probably give our readers a sketch of the country through the columns of the REPUBLICAN shortly.

The returns from other States are so meagre, and so much has to be estimated that we will not attempt to give the telegraphic returns from but two or three States other than our own. Enough is known, however, to convince us that the Democrats have gained several Congressmen, and at least one Governor, Tilden, in New York. Three negroes were killed outright, as far as heard from, thirty-four were wounded, ten to fifteen of them mortally. Quiet was soon restored, and the voting went on as usual. They claim a gain of one Democratic Congressman down there.

After a rest of a few years, the chaps who observe Hallowe'en at all hazards, were out on Saturday night, seeking what they might destroy; doing a good deal of damage, in one way or another. If they are found they will pay dearly for their "fun," which appears to consist in anything that will make decent citizens trouble and expense.

Major Burke endeavored to horse-whip Governor Kellogg in New Orleans the other day. The Gov. drew a revolver and blazed away, giving the gallant major a close call for his life. The Major then drew a pistol and fired four shots at Kellogg, none of them taking effect. This we consider mighty poor shooting.

Some petty thieving has already taken place in town although winter has not yet shut down on us. This being the case, we may expect a good run of it during the cold weather. The demand for Yale locks, therefore, is brisk. It is better to beg than to steal, and a good deal safer.

There was a fire at the Oil City Barrel Works on Thursday last, that resulted in a loss of \$10,000. At one time it was feared the whole establishment and a part of the town would be destroyed.

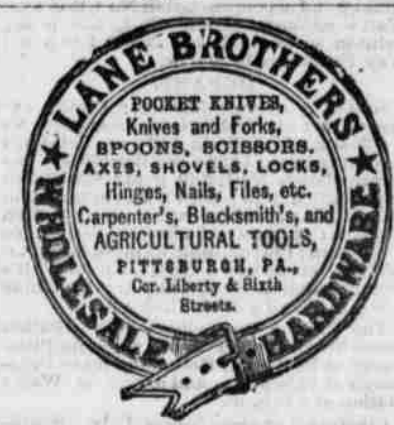
