Tuesday Morning Session. Institute met at 9 o'clock. Called to order by Supt. Roll call. Instructions in Penmanship by Prof. Curtis. Dept. State Supt. R. Curry was then introduced, and addressed the Institute. Exercises in Orthography conducted by Prof. Curtis. Adjourned.

Afternoon Session. Institute met at 1:30 o'clock. Called to order by Supt. Instructions by Dr. Curry. Remarks by Prof. Curtis regarding "School Apparatus" and means by which the teacher may obtain the necessary implements to aid in the work. Remarks by Dr. Curry. Adjourned.

Evening Session. Institute met at 7 o'clock. Music by Institute. Roll call. Members respond with sentiments. Recital by Ella Davis. Select Reading by Emma Dawson. Essay by Debbie Woodington. Select reading by Emma Woodington. Rehearsal by Nettie Hunter. Select reading by Prof. Curtis. After recess followed a lecture by Dr. Curry, subject, "The Earth as a Model School." Adjourned.

Wednesday Morning Session. Called to order by Supt. Music by Institute. Instructions in Reading, Orthography, &c., by Prof. Curtis. Valuable and interesting instructions in Geography by Dr. Curry. Recess. Grammar and school government by Prof. Curtis. Adjourned.

Afternoon Session. Called to order. History, by Prof. Curtis. Physical Geography by Dr. Curry. School government by Prof. Curtis, continued by Dr. Curry. Adjourned.

Evening Session. Institute called to order by Supt. Music by Institute. Roll call; teachers respond with sentiments. Declarations, Essays, Select Reading, &c., by members of Institute. Lecture by Dr. Curry, subject, "The Earth as a Cosmical Body." Recitations by Prof. Curtis. Adjourned.

Thursday Morning Session. Opened with music by Institute. Roll call. Remarks on educational topics by Prof. Curtis. Oral Arithmetic by Dr. Curry. Adjourned.

Afternoon Session. Institute called to order. Roll call. Music. Dr. Curry then delivered a few words of farewell to the Institute. History was then taken up by Supt. Rohrer, followed by Prof. Curtis. Instructions in Composition and Letter Writing by Prof. Curtis. Adjourned.

Thursday evening a reading entertainment was given by Prof. Curtis, for the benefit of the Institute fund.

Friday Morning Session. Institute called to order. Music. Roll call. Arithmetic was considered by Prof. Curtis, with black-board illustrations. Adjourned.

Afternoon Session. Institute called to order. Music. Roll call. General advice to teachers by Prof. Curtis. A vote of thanks was returned to the instructors for

their untiring efforts to make the Institute a success. On motion of Secretary Institute adjourned sine die.
