The System of Assessment.

For twenty-five years have our State and local authorities practiced a fraudulent system of State and Municipal taxation. The idea of swearing an Assessor to assess all property at its true value, with an embargo of 26 mills for School, 10 for County, 10 for Road and 10 for Poor purposes is a load that no man can carry who has any conscience lift. With an encumbrance of 56 mills on the dolfar, it is no wonder that Assessors return property at less than one third its val e, and thereby impose double taxes on all the inferior kinds of proper ty, while the valuable pays but half rates. Without taking the equity feature of our present system into no count the moral phase should be enough to attract the attention of Legislators and bring about a speedy change.

The idea of annually swearing thousands of men throughout the State to assess property at its true value, and then buding that the rate is fixed at one-fourth or one-third is too preposterous to follow any longer.

Let the Legislature repeal the pres-Let the Legislature repeal the present excessive high rates and substitute 5 mills for school, 3 mills for county and road, 1 mill for poor purposes, and give the Caurts power to increase these rates about through a necessity a higher rate must be imposed. In the destruction of school houses or county buildings by fire, or the public roads and bridges destroyed by floods, this contingency may arise. by floods, this contingency may arise, but in every case a substantial reason must be given to the public before a higher rate could be imposed. Besides, property would then be rated as coutemplated by the law (at its true value) and not a single case of moral perjury need occur in the State. These high rates under the present law act like a ghost to the timid, and completely de-feat the true object of taxation. Let the Legislature reduce the rates at least, if nothing else can be accomplished this session. - Clearfield Republican.
