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

-The passage of the Force bill by the House, in the form in which it comes, will prove an agreeable surprise to the quiet-loving people. The suspension of the writ of habeas corpus is coufined to four Southern States that have been most turbulent, and to a period of two years of time. It simply means that Congress intends that order shall be observed, and that it is willing to entrust the President with the power to enforce it. It is really a Peace bill, and will lead to a prompt suspension of the turbulence and trouble at the South. This, too, is precisely why the Democracy opposed it. To keep the South in a disorganized, turbulent and warlike condition is part of the deliberate policy of the Democratic party. Their hopes in the next Presidential election depend upon it,-and these are blasted by the enactment of a bill, wise, just, and restricted in its scope, but which will effectually stop the abuses that have reigned at the South since the Ka Klux laws expired by limitation .-Pitteburgh Gazette.
