Western Correspondence.

LONG ROCK, RICHLAND CO., WIS., March 29, 1875.

Ed. REPUBLICAN:—

Since my last letter the weather has become somewhat moderate; the snow is leaving slowly. This spring comes slowly, indeed, for us here, as we generally commence farming in March, but this season no wheat will be sown before the middle of April.

There is not much winter grain raised in this country. Spring wheat of different varieties does well here on the prairies, but further north among the oak openings winter wheat is raised successfully some crops yield forty bushels per acre. In the country south of this mining is carried on extensively, in the Lead Mines of Wisconsin; thousands of men are employed; and also a new discovery in the mining districts has become profitable in the article of Mineral Paint. An extra article of paint can now be furnished at the small cost of five dollars per barrel of any desired color, after being put through a chemical process; it is almost entirely used here in painting public buildings, churches, school houses, etc.

We are once more in trouble on account of "Lo! the poor Indian." About two years ago the Government transferred the Chippewa, Manomanees and Winnabagoes to the reservation in Nebraska, but they are coming back to this State again, and without the consent of the agents. I have wished that those of our Eastern men that have so much to say of the "poor Indian" were obliged to live with those same poor Indians a short time, and less would be said in their behalf. This poor, degraded son of the forest has more privilege than the whites. Our game laws do not prohibit the red man, but the white man has to come to time. I think the Indian is a natural born thief,—is the laziest human being in existence; and as to begging, he prides himself on this point.

The inhabitants here are from all parts of the world. The Norwegians and Welch are our best naturalized citizens. During the late war they were among the first to enlist; casting their influence always with the right, are all strong Republicans in principle. They are just the class of foreigners to go West, as for farming qualifications they are second to none.

Wisconsin has some of best pinery in the United States; and the Chippewa, Black, and Wisconsin rivers furnish more pine lumber than any other in the Western States. The Wisconsin river is about as large as the Allegheny, except in depth; and for the benefit of your lumbermen I would say that the channel changes every few hours, as the sand keeps moving all the while.
