Constitution Changing in the South.

The Republic Magazine for May publishes two important papers on the Democratic movement now going on in the South to remodel their State Constitutions so as to defeat the objects of the Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments, and ignore the reconstruction policy. At the close of the war and commencement of the reconstruction of the States in rebellion, it was necessary to make the new State Constitutions conform to the changed condition of affairs. It was also obligatory on each State to submit its new Constitution to Congress for approval or modification. Now, however, each State may alter or remodel its Constitution by a Con-

vention of the people, and adopt the new instrument, without consulting Congress. The Democrats are now taking advantage of this, and are framing new State Constitutions to suit their own peculiar views on the race, school, State Sovereignty, and other important questions. The danger to the stability of our institutions, growing out of this movement, can scarcely be overrated, as it indicates a spirit and the inauguration of a state of affairs that can scarcely fail of resulting in another rebellion.
