The natural result is an unusual degree of satisfaction throughout the rank and file of the party. Every man seems determined to make a good fight for victory.

It is very evident that the Democracy have been split asunder by the financial part of the Ohio Democratic platform. The New York World is outspoken and bitter against it, as it is indeed, against the Wallace faction of the Democracy in this State. It proclaims that the Democracy of New York will favor gold and silver as the only legal tender; no currency convertible with coin; and steady steps toward specie payments, with no steps backward. The New York Tribune, strange to say, tries more to put itself in accord with the Ohio Democracy than does the World. The latter journal, evidently, realizes hopefulness if its party can be made to come up to its standard, and so does not spare those who disagree. Yet there can be no doubt that the Ohio platform expressed the prevailing sentiment on the financial question West. The World is really more correct when it aims its blows at the operations of the party leaders in this State. It charges that Wallace is responsible for the bad quality of the House, last Winter, and that its conduct was a serious injury to the prospects of the Democracy in this State. This circumstance is serving to widen the breach, which already has become quite serious.

Already, while the crown of Alfonso rests lightly on his youthful brow, a conspiracy is reported against him. It has been discovered and quelled; but from the characters involved, the Government concluded to employ measures of extraordinary rigour and force. Hidalgo, one of the leaders, was associated with Prim in the revolution of 1866. Under Amadeus, he aspired to high honors, but the sudden abdication of that gentleman ended the schemes of Hidalgo very suddenly. He has again risen to momentary prominence, only to subside into an expatriated convict.

Emlenton and Shippenville Narrow Gauge R. R.

A charter has been obtained for this road, and the company's organized capital stock \$150,000. Shares \$100 each. The route will be from Emlenton via Dogtown, Beaver, Edenburg and intermediate points to Shippenville. From thence the road can be extended to Clarion. The following is the organization affected: President, James Bennett; Directors, J. C. Porterfield, R. W. Porterfield, M. Hollings, J. W. Rowland, H. E. Bradley, of Emlenton, Jacob Black, W. R. Shippen, of Shippenville, P. F. Kreibbs, Edenburg. The survey commenced Monday morning last. The road is to be completed in one hundred days from the commencement of the work.

This road passes through a section of country unequalled in point of productiveness, and its terminus at Clarion will not only prove a great convenience to our people, but will add materially to the permanent prosperity of our town, by bringing in our midst branches of manufacturing industry needed to meet the requirements of the country surrounding us. The gentlemen having the enterprise in charge have the ability to put it through to successful completion and will do so. The building of the road is a fixed fact, and those of our people desiring to make what has proved in all previous cases a desirable investment, and at the same time help their own as well as the public interests, should lend their aid to this needed enterprise.—Clarion Democrat.

THE OIL CREEK R. R.—A suit has been instituted in the United States Court at Pittsburgh, against the Oil Creek Railroad at the instance of G. P. Davis, United States Collector for the nineteenth district of Pennsylvania, at Erie. This sum, as is stated in the affidavit, is due said plaintiffs for internal revenue taxes remaining unpaid. The suit is brought with notice to David McCargo, receiver of said road. The items are as follows: Tax \$100,506.88 Int. at 1 per cent a month 92,808.55 Specific penalty under Sec. 122 act of July 1st, 1864, amended 8,000.00 Assessable penalty fifty per cent. 50,253.44 Total \$251,568.87 A summons was issued on the corporation.
