

PENNSYLVANIA.

Pennsylvania has gone Republican by a large majority. A dispatch from Philadelphia dated at 3 o'clock this (Thursday) morning, says that thirty-two counties foot up a majority of 20,759 for Hartranft. The Republican State ticket is undoubtedly carried by at least 25,000 majority. Thus have the people of the Keystone State rebuked the party whose cry for years has been anything to get office. Any sacrifice of principles, any violation of convictions, any kind of a platform to please the masses, all to be broken over and thrown to the winds if they once get into power. It is glorious to see that the people know with whom their interests are safe, and carry out their convictions at the polls. We are now assured of a good and honest State administration, and a big majority for the Republican candidate for President next fall.

New York.

New York on Wednesday afternoon was doubtful, neither party being sure of having carried the State. Up to noon the returns indicate the election of twenty Republicans and twelve Democrats to the State Senate. The Democrats claim the election of 70 members of Assembly to 58 Republicans.

New Jersey.

The Republicans elect five out of eight Senators chosen this year, making the Senate and House both Republican.

Wisconsin.

The Republicans have elected the whole State ticket, by about 5,000 majority, and carried the Legislature by thirty on a joint ballot.

Massachusetts.

Massachusetts is Republican by a small majority. Three tickets were in the field there.

Minnesota.

The whole Republican State ticket is elected in this State by majorities ranging from 4,000 to 8,000. Later returns say that the election of the State Treasurer is uncertain.

Thanksgiving Proclamation.

WASHINGTON, October 17, 1875. In accordance with a practice at once wise and beautiful, we have been accustomed, as the year is drawing to a close, to devote an occasion to the humble expression of our thanks to Almighty God for the ceaseless and distinguished benefits bestowed upon us as a nation, and for His mercies and protection during the closing year. Amid the rich and free enjoyment of all our advantages we should not forget the source from whence they are derived and the extent of our obligations to the Father of all mercies. We have full reason to renew our thanks to Almighty God for favors bestowed upon us during the year. By His continuing mercy civil and religious liberty have been maintained, peace has reigned within our borders, labor and enterprise have produced their merited rewards, and to His watchful Providence we are indebted for security from pestilence and other national calamities. Apart from the national blessings, each individual among us has occasion to thoughtfully recall and devoutly recognize the favors and protection which he has enjoyed. Now, therefore, I, Ulysses S. Grant, President of the United States, do recommend that on Thursday, the 25th of November, the people of the United States, abstaining from all secular pursuits and from their accustomed avocations, do assemble in their respective places of worship, and in such form as may seem most appropriate to their own hearts, offer to Almighty God their acknowledgments and thanks for all His mercies, and their humble prayers for a continuance of His divine favors. In witness whereof, I hereunto set my hand and cause the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at the city of Washington, this 27th day of October, in the year our Lord, 1875, and of the Independence of the United States, the one hundredth. U. S. GRANT.
