THE MEMORY OF THE JUST IS BLESSED. A Tribute to the Memory of Mrs. Rev. A. R. Sheriff.

BY REV. A. COPLIN.

Mary A. Sheriff, daughter of J. and P. Munsell, was born in Troga, Penn., August 15, 1840. She inherited a rare combination of mental and moral power, which formed the basis of ripe intellectual and moral attainments, and a strong, symmetrical character. At the early age of seven she lost her mother. Fortunately she was cared for by an aunt and uncle
who in no ordinary degree took the
place of parents, giving her a thorough
practical training and providing excellent scholastic advantages. Though
carefully instructed from childhood, religiously, she did not until twenty years of age feel the necessity of a new birth-a radical change of heart wrought by the Holy Ghost. Under a deep sense of utter sinfulness and ruin, she then publicly presented herself as a seeker of salvation at a Methodist alter, and there after a renunciation of her own will and pride of heart, she took Christ as her Prophet, Priest and King, and received a clear evidence of her adoption into the family of God. Her moral convictions, as well as her remarkable decision and firmness of character were such that she never in subsequent life wato him every day of my life."

While her natural feelings and social relations all inclined her toward the communion of another church, yet the yearnings of her renewed heart, no less than the decision of judgment and the dictates of duty, led her to choose 3 92 the Methodist Episcopal Church as 10 13 her spiritual home. While her broad religious views and generous Christian sympathies caused her to recognize all Christians of whatever name as mem bers of a common household; she ever cherished a peculiar love for the church of her choice and was always ready to defend its doctrines and usages. As a Christian worker she had but few equals. Wherever she lived her pastor felt the influence of her brave sympathetic heart and strong arm. In personal effort for souls, in the Sunday-school, the prayer and class meeting, she was specially active. Most of her maiden life was devoted to the profession of teaching in which she was remarkably suc cessful, both in training the minds of her pupils and stimulating them to high and holy purposes. Through the influence of her character and training, many young gentlemen and la-dies have entered upon a Christian life and are now filling places of usefulness and honor.

She came to this coast in company with her only sister-Mrs. A. Coplin-in September 1866. May 2d, 1869, she was united in marriage to Rev. A. R. Sheriff, of the California Conference. As a wife she was deeply effectionate and tender, ever studying her husband's interests and happiness ever aiding him by judicious counsel and loving sympathy. She was al-ways firm when he might falter, brave when his courage might be weak, ready to suffer if by so doing she could shield the heart of him she Rates of Advertising.

sacred drawing toward this relation and decided to accept no offers of marriage outside the ministerial calling. Though keenly alive to the peculia trials and temporal sacrifices it involved, she would sconer be the wife of an itinerant McModist preacher than be the consort of the most boursed officer of the State. She counted it all joy to spend and be spent in her Master's work. She was the social center of the community in which they were located; drawing around her both the young and the aged, her home was the place of the most delightful religious gatherings. Her gifts of song, consecrated to Christ, added to the charm of her home and the influence of her social life. As a mother she cherished the despest affection for her darling boys, for whose moral and intellectual training she was already laying wise At the last conference her husband

was appointed to Downieville where she immediately took hold of church work with him with zeal, and rejoiced to see the Sabbath-school impreve under her wise suggestions. In the midst of great usefulness, just when it was thought she could least be spared, she was stricken down. On Saturday, at 2 P. M., she was taken with fainting and was borne to her bed, from which she never arose. During her illness she exhibited great faith and fortitude in severe suffering. As the hour approached when she knew she must depart, she broke out in triumphant exultation over death. Turning to her physician (a Christian gen-tleman) she said: "Dr., I do not trust in any thing I have done, but alone in the merits of the Lord Jesus Christ. The blood saves." To another she said, "Put on the whole armor of God; do not put it half on." To another, "Trust only in the precious blood of Jesus." About an hour before she breathed her last she requested the friends to sing. With stifled utterances they sang, "Home of the Soul," "Sweet Bye and Bye," and some others. During an interval she remarked, "All last night I heard the sweetest music. I thought, when I got well, I would quench my thirst from the fountain near our door; but now I shall quench it, forever from the in any thing I have done, but alone in I shall quench it forever from the river of life.
