

Our Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Apr. 14, '77.

His occupation being gone, Mr. Chamberlain has, by surrendering his position in South Carolina, performed the only official act left him to do; but he will certainly yet figure prominently in public life in other spheres. Mr. Chamberlain is a man who is not appreciated at his full worth even by the Republican party at the North. His attitude through the conflict just ended in his State, and in particular, his last letter to President Hayes, show him to be possessed of fine abilities as a lawyer, orator and writer. He has made a grand good fight against the abuses in the Republican party in South Carolina, and we have thus rewarded him. Our word for it, you have not heard the name of Chamberlain for the last time.

This matter being ended, we have but two wars left on our hands at present—the one in Louisiana and the one on the plains. The Commissioners appointed for that purpose will probably settle the first, and the arrival of Crazy Horse with fifteen hundred hostiles at the Cheyenne Agency practically closed the Indian war for the season, although, after undergoing repairs, it will probably be reopened as usual shortly. However, hostilities are not likely to be resumed until the warriors have been properly fattened and newly equipped by the Great Father. Then look out for "Lo! the poor Indian."

The U. S. Supreme Court has at last decided that the million and a half dollars appropriated to the Centennial Exhibition by Congress reverted to the U. S. Treasury, and was not the property of the stockholders. This reverses the decision of the lower Court, and has the effect to reduce the value of the Centennial stock from about 80 to 25 cents on the dollar. It will also probably result in deciding Congress to be more generous than it would otherwise have been in appropriating an amount to enable the United States to make a creditable display at the approaching French Exhibition.

The Clerk of the House has not yet completed his roll of the members of the lower branch of the forty-fifth Congress, but it is understood that 285 out of 293 certificates of membership have been received. Two hundred and sixty have thus far drawn pay. If the clerk places on his rolls the names of all Republicans whose election is claimed, the House will stand 149 Democrats to 144 Republicans. The doubtful districts, whose representatives have not been placed upon the rolls are nine in number, as follows: Two in Louisiana; two in Florida; two in Missouri; and one each in South Carolina, Colorado and California.

We have been having a fearful storm down this way. A heavy north-east storm caused a high tide along the coast, that rose far above any in the memory even of the proverbial oldest inhabitant. The only means of travel along many of the streets in Norfolk was in rowboats, and the damage done to property there and in Baltimore was considerable. There are many citizens of this vicinity who will henceforth hold water in greater dislike than ever.

The exports of fresh beef continue to increase. The quantity shipped to Great Britain from New York and Philadelphia in March amounts to 6,707,855 pounds, valued at \$590,085, making a total in nine months of 29,908,810 pounds, valued at \$2,677,383. John Bull says if he had known this, he never would have given the United States to Jonathan.

The attention of the editor is called to the fact that those old counterfeit \$1000 notes are again in circulation. A word to the wise is sufficient. For a while you had better take no change over a \$500 bill, and when you have a day to spare run through your pockets and see if you have not been taken in.
