Our Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 18, 77. At last after all our many damp wet weeks of waiting, we Washingtonians are being favored with some as fine samples of summer weather as mind of man could ask for. A little hot, mayhaps, the thermometer managing yesterday to struggle up as high as 80, but when you take a capital cool breeze into consideration, it is, upon the whole, exceedingly comfortable. And now if we only had our beloved congress here, to share our weather with us, we would be satisfied.

Representative Harrison, Carter Harrison, our Harrison, as the Chicago Times has it, him of Marine Band notoriety, democrat, of Illinois, denies that he has withdrawn from the Speakership contest. This information gains its particular importance from the knowledge it gives us that the Hon. Carter is running—it is something to know this. Heretofore the fact appears to have been kept very quiet—I never heard of it before and doubt if your readers ever did—and we will probably never hear of it again. Therefore I make it public.

The Secretary of the Treasury yesterday decided that there could be no compromise of the Chicago crooked whiskey cases, and directed that the district attorney at Chicago should proceed with their prosecution. The Secretary says that the expectation of compromise caused by the alleged action of his predecessor may have led to confession and a waiver of legal rights by the present defendants, and therefore he is inclined to yield to their wish that they have an opportunity to appeal to Congress for such relief as it may think right to grant them. In the meantime, however, the prosecution will proceed.

Regarding the charges made against Attorney General Devens in being remiss in the prosecution of those accused of being connected with the Mountain Meadow Massacre, I may state that all of these offences are against the Territory, and not against the United States, and consequently come under the jurisdiction of the Territory of Utah. The sum of \$20,000 was appropriated by Congress to be used by the Department of Justice in prosecuting those suspected, and this sum has all been expended. Another appropriation of \$20,000 for the same purpose will become available on the 1st of July, which will be expended by the Department as intended.

The account of destructive forest fires in New York and the New England States which circulates by telegraph to-day is only a day's record, but it shows a heavy direct pecuniary loss to the country. Hundreds of families, too, are deprived of their home. These are among the immediate effects. Those yet to come by the rapid destruction of our forests by flames and the axe, are decrease of rains, increasing periods of drought and consequent loss of fertility of soil. I only wish that all the people of this country could be made to see this matter now as they will be obliged to see it in a comparatively few years hence.

Poor Hatlock. They have put up a brass effigy of him in New York, and John G. Whittier writes a memorial poem of platitude unsurpassed by even Whittier at his worst. His fate

should be a warning to all young men who perpetrate poetry. Particularly referred to my friend, your city's celebrated elegiac poet Hatlock.

Ex-President Grant has gone to Europe. He sailed from Philadelphia in the steamer "Indiana" yesterday, and as he left our shores carried with him the best wishes of hundreds of thousands of our citizens, who will anxiously look for his successful arrival on the other side of the Atlantic. After his many years of public service Gen. Grant is entitled to rest and recreation. No President was ever subjected to more abuse while in office, and yet I doubt whether any one ever made a more honest effort to serve his country faithfully. That his services to the country in war and in peace are appreciated has been shown by the honors heaped upon him since his retirement from the Presidential chair. Wherever he has gone he has been most enthusiastically received. This has been the case notably during the last few days in Philadelphia. That he will be highly honored abroad I have not the least doubt, for his fame is world-wide.
