WASHINGTON, D. C., June 8, '77. From the lugubrious faces carried about by the friends of Wayne Mc-Veigh this morning, it is inferred that they regret, when too late, that he did not take the judicious advice offered against rushing recklessly in to occupy ground where experienced gladiators had feared to tread. The whole town is grinning over Butler's letter

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
