#### THE PRIMARY ELECTIONS.

The Republican Primary Elections were held throughout the county on Saturday last. The vote was very light, as will be seen by the table of the official vote.

The Return Judges met in the Arbitration Room of the Court House yesterday at 2 o'clock p. m. The meeting was presided over by C. A Randall, Esq., Chairman of the County Committee. Messrs. H. S. Brockway and D. Graham were appointed Secretaries. It was decided by the board that there were three illegal votes polled in Tionesta Township. Moved that the vote of said township be thrown out. The Return Judges being generally members of the County Committee, a chairman for the ensuing year was chosen in the person of Mr. L. Agnew of Tionesta boro.

The case of Mr. Dowling, the Toledo Postmaster, who refused to resign at the behest of Mr. Reed, Deacon Smith, and a few others who are urging it against the nearly unanimous protest of the people accommodated by that office, remains in statu quo. It will likely be very soon determined, on the return of the President, who is said to favor removal, while both Mr. Key and Schurz oppose it. It may safely be said that the President could not do a more unpopular act at this time, as the whole business has such an ugly look of bargaining and dickering on the part of those most urgently domanding the change.

The whole country will doubtless learn with surprise of the enforced resignation of Watts, Commissioner of Agriculture, as he was understood to be satisfactory to the President. But it is now given out that the President satisfied himself that the administration of the Bureau, which can be made such a valuable auxiliary to agricultural interests if energetically and wisely conducted, was in very inefficient hands, and Mr. Watts' resignation was at once asked for. Its insignificance as compared with some of the other Departments has, in a measure, served to shield it from the sharp criticisms that the nepotism and favoritism known to have existed there would otherwise have provoked. The new Commissioner is well spoken of as a very energetic gentleman, admirably calculated by his acquirements and executive ability for the position.

The pains of defeat and disappointment in the case of Prof. Langston, who has persistently urged his own ap-Haytı; at least that is the programme of the slate makers. As Mr. Langston is not accustomed to refuse office, it is presumed he will accept.

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

WAFHINGTON, D. C., June 29, '77.

Democratic politicians and their sympathizers are evidently much exhilirated over the action of the Iowa State Convention yesterday, and point significantly to the resolutions adopted at the Soldiers Reunion, at Providence. with undisguised gratification, while enumerating a long list of county conventions that have taken action similar to the Iowa Convention in refusing to commit themselves to the President's "Southern Policy." The hypocricy underlying all their pretended approval of the President's conciliatory course stands out so prominent that the wayfaring man, unless blind as well as foolish, can see it.

The voice of the public in favor of the repeal of the demonstization act of Feb. 12, 1873, grows more and more outspoken if the reports from the South and West are to be relied on. Its opponents are discouraged thereon. and demoralized, and should the reported defection of Secretary Sherman which has been current here several days prove true, their stubborn retreat may soon become a disasterous route. dwelling house thereon. 3.
