ening, have grown rich. The soil is loam, varying from sandy to clayey, and surface gently undulating, intersected with small streams and occasional wet meadows in which deposts of peat or muck are stored, sufficient to fertilize the whole upland surface, after it has been exhausted of its

natural fertility. It is certainly one of the most extensive fertile tracts, in an almost level position, and suitable condition for pleasant farm-ing, that we know of this side of the Westprairies. We found some of the oldest farms apparently just as profitably productive as when first cleared of forest

productive as when first cleared of forest fifty or a hundred years ago.

The geologist would soon discover the cause of this continued fortility. The whole country is a marine deposit, and all through the soil we found evidences of calcareous substances, generally in the form of indurated calcareous mari, showing purpose distinct forms of ancient shells. ing many distinct forms of ancient shells, of the tertiary formation; and this marly substance is scattered all through the self. in a very comminuted form, and in the exact condition most easily assimmilated
