 Hartranft and Cbmeron.

The Democratic papers are making a mountain out of a molehill, when they try to make it appear that there is likely to be a rupture between Governor Hartranft and Senator Cameron. In speaking upon this subject the Williamsport Gazette and Bulletin says: "Undue importance is given by some of the papers to the defeat of Mr. Howard J. Reeder in the State Convention as foreshadowing an open rupture between Governor Hartranft and Senator J. D. Cameron. That there is nothing in the report worthy of serious consideration is proven by the statement of Mr. Reeder himself, who thus spoke to a friend after the convention had finished its work: 'I do not regard the struggle to-day as a struggle between the Governor and J. Donald Cameron at all. I believe that Senator Cameron's sympathies, personally, were with me, and that while they were so, he has maintained a strict neutrality. Mr. Mackey's opposition to me had the effect of arraying against me the Cameron influence in the State, and gave to the contest an appearance of that character without it being such in reality. I believe that the friendship between the Senator and Governor is such that it is impossible to place them in antagonism to each other. I believe Mr. Mackey opposed me because the Governor was for me. I can conceive of no other reason. He has emphatically denied that this was the case, both to myself and to the Governor; but, nevertheless, I can account for his action in no other way. That Mr. Mackey has been estranging himself from the Governor is undoubtedly true, and it is owing to the Governor's having refused to make certain appointments lately which were urged upon him by Mr. Mackey. I believe that this opposition to me on the part of the latter is an attempt to punish the Governor for having refused to comply with his wishes.' Mr. Reeder promptly called on Mr. Passmore and congratulated him on his nomination, and assured him of the earnest support of himself and friends during the campaign. Democratic papers, therefore, may as well spare themselves the labor of trying to manufacture sentiment out of what does not exist."

—One evidence of an improvement in business is that of a marked demand upon our book houses for their publications. Thus far the Fall trade has been good, and the indications are that there will be heavy requisitions upon the great establishments which furnish the literary pabulum for the country. These are hopeful signs, and added to those other proofs of returning prosperity to which we referred yesterday, they will help to swell the aggregate and aid in bringing about the general revival of business.—*Phila. North American.*

—Watterson, of the Louisville Courier-Journal, has a word of advice to the people of Kentucky and the South generally, regarding mob rule. He is evidently in earnest when he says: "It is for us, gentlemen of the South, to call off the desperadoes. That is the whole business, and there's no use mincing matters. By or before 1880 we want that question sent to the rear. It is not, woe to the North, woe to the South, woe to Republican Government in America."

—There is a little scrap from the record of Amos C. Noyes which will not endear him to the colored citizens and the old anti-slavery men. While in the Legislature, in 1863, Mr. Noyes voted in favor of "An act to prevent the immigration of negroes and mulattoes into this State." The first section of this bill made it a penal offense for any person of color to move into Pennsylvania from any State or Territory; and the second section provided penalties for any person, white or colored, who aided in bringing negroes or mulattoes into the State. For such an infamous law Amos C. Noyes voted. To-day he is begging votes among the same people, whom, fourteen years ago he either wanted to drive into slavery or incarcerate in Northern prisons because of their active opposition to that institution.—*Clearfield Journal.*

—We commend the more serious tone of the President's speeches at the South. The silly and trifling material sometimes used, was laid aside at the cities of the South, where he had the opportunity of speaking before representative Southern audiences, and the importance of good feeling between the sections, promoted by good faith on the part of the South. He also urged the fact that the South has a motive in cultivating the friendly feeling of the North, in that she will thus secure capital to give activity, population and prosperity to her territory. All this and more was said in a commendable spirit. We are gratified that the President takes this course, as it gives some point to his southern tour.—*Com. Gazette.*
