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AN ORDINANCE

PROMINITING THE TRANSPONTATION OF NITRO-OLYCERINE AND DANGEROUS COM-POUNDS THROUGH THE BOROUGH.

Passed Oct. 13, 1877.

Be it ordained by the Burgess and Council of the Borough of Tionesta, and it is here-by ordained by anthority of the same : SEC. 1. That if any person shall know ingly have or transport through the street of said Berough any explosive and dan-gerous material known as Nitro-Glycerine. Dualin, Dynamite, Gun Cotton and Phos phorus or compounds of the same by any name called in any package called a torname called in any package called a tor-podo or other vessel containing said com-pounds, for every such offence the person so carrying or transporting shall be deem-ed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on proof of a violation of this ordinance shall be fined not less than fifty, nor more than two hundred dollars, by the Burgess or any Justice of the Peace of said Borough. Said fine to go into the general Borough fund except as hereinaftor provided. SEC. 2. That in every case of the viola-tion of this ordinance, without regard to the owner of the explosive material it shall be lawful for the Borougn Con-stable or the High Constable, either on warrant (based upou a complaint) issued by the Burgess or any Justice of


