LOCAL AND MISCELLANEOUS.

—Rev. Elliot will preach in the Presbyterian Church, on Sunday next morning and evening. Sabbath School at 3 o'clock P. M.

—Mr. A. Gordon, of Elkhart, Ind., arrived in town yesterday, looking well. Forest county will draw him back once in about so often.

—This kind of weather is very apt to bring out a great number of pairs of rubber boots, which are very fashionable here, especially among the unfair sex.

—We publish the Court Proclamation and Trial List for December Term in to-day's paper. We notice that Hutton's suit against Conner, for libel, is on the list.

—The wet weather of the past week has caused our roads to become very bad. The road between this place and Newmansville always becomes almost impassable at this time of year, and this fall is no exception.

—To-morrow is Thanksgiving Day. It is to be hoped that it will be observed generally, as it is a legal holiday, and consequently should be kept as a matter of law and appointment, if not of gratitude.

—John Reck is collector of the county tax for Tionesta Borough. He is surging around, "giving warning," and the boys will all have to "come down," or John will appoint himself a committee of investigation to find out the reason why.

—John Muenzenberger is erecting a house between Prothonotary Clark's and Esq. Irwin's. The size of the domicile is 16x27. Smith Foreman has the job. John is a hard worker, and we are glad to secure him as a permanent resident.

—Messrs. J. W. Ward and P. V. Mercillott, of Jenks township, were in town last week, both looking well. From them we learn that Dr. Towler is still at work trying to exhaust the water in his wells; also that pigeons and small game are very plenty out there this fall.

—In accordance with the orders of the Boro Council, a good foot-walk has been built from the corner of Walnut street to the bridge, or nearly there. This is an improvement which has for a long time been badly needed, and will be duly appreciated by all who have occasion to pass to and from the depot.

—Rev. Dr. S. J. M. Eaton, of Franklin, favored us with a call on Wednesday last, and on the same day we saw Mr. A. P. Whittaker, the veteran editor of the Spectator, striking out for the woods, with a gun on his shoulder.

—We understand that a man named Clark was badly injured one day last week while helping to raise a barn at Russell's mill, up Bear Creek. It seems that one of the poles on which a large stick of timber was being raised, broke, and the falling timber struck Clark, hurting him badly about the back, which it was feared was broken.

—A McLaren, breeder of Games and Game Bantams, Meadville, Pa., has favored us with his price list and circular. Oil Developments.

The Cornwell well, on Dutch Hill, is probing the earth for oil or "indications." It is down something over two hundred feet.

Nothing is doing at present on the Woods Heirs' tract, but Mr. Baldwin assures us that another well will be put down there soon.

W. G. Lee has a rig up on Azro Copeland's farm, in Harmony township, and will commence operations at once.

Preparations are being made for sinking a well on Selden Whitman's farm, three miles up the creek.

At Balltown the well of which we have made mention heretofore, is pretty nearly, if not quite down. As soon as it is down the tools will be used for putting down another well near it. These wells are situated up Logan Run.

Oliver Proper and one Fetterman are putting up a rig for a well at Balltown, which will be pushed through forthwith.

—Well, after a good many flashes in the pan, we have at length had a genuine burglary in town. The store of Derickson & Co. was entered on Monday night, and money and goods to the amount of about \$100 were taken. The burglars effected an entrance through a rear window of the store, by removing a pane of glass, which had been fastened in with tacks only. The size of the glass, we understand, was about 18x20. No one sleeping in the store, of course the burglars had it all their own way after once effecting an entrance. There was about \$15 in silver in the money drawer, which was taken, and revolvers, gloves, pocket cutlery, and a pair of overshoes made up the amount. Perhaps more has been taken which has not yet been missed. The burglars drew the bolt and passed out the front door, virtually "going through" the store. Everybody had their own suspicion as to who did the business, but nearly all to whom we have talked think that the indications point toward two strangers who came to town on Saturday and departed Tuesday morning. They were ostensibly selling some little trinkets which looked almost "too thin" to afford them a fair living. No arrests have as yet been made.

—Rev. Payne is at present engaged holding a revival in the M. E. Church in this place, having commenced his meetings on Monday evening. The attendance thus far has been very fair, and he feels encouraged thereby. Prayer meetings are held at half-past six every evening; regular services begin at seven.

—A slight spirit of rafting has been going on as a result of the late rise. Very little lumber has been sent down the river.
