We devote considerable space to-day to the Address of the Oil Producers of Pennsylvania, on the subject of discriminations in freights by the railroads, and the Free Pipe bill, now before the Legislature. We publish this because we believe that, although it may not now be apparent to all, the day is not far distant when this question will be of vital interest to Forest County; indeed, the lull in operations in our county at present, is due entirely to low priced oil, and hence, we are directly interested in any measure which promises the speedy development of our territory.

"The Free Pipe bill will pass—it must pass, because it is simple justice; because Providence will not permit one corporation to trample on and crush out of existence a whole race of law-abiding, industrious people. If the present Legislature resolves itself into a herd of cattle, to be purchased at so much per head, the next one will not. In the great march of events the cheapest and best method of doing a thing will prevail.
